A Letter from Bobby Nakoolok, who is training for the Ministry at the College at Pangnirtung in the Diocese of the Arctic, and whose training is being helped by donations from the people of Badsey and Aldington. This letter first appeared in the Arctic Diocesan Newsletter.

BOBBY NAKOOLAK from Coral Harbour, N.W.T.

Now I am going to tell you my own story which starts when I was about fourteen years old, when I used to go with my father everytime he went off hunting. Unfortunately, I became sick and had to go to hospital shortly after this, spending three years without even being able to stand on the floor, and I did not understand any English either, which made it very difficult indeed. After hospital I went to Fort Churchill and then back home. Then back to Churchill where I worked as a carpenter for about three months. Following that there were many other jobs, working at the Laundry plant in the Canadian Army: with the Department of Public Works as a Clearance Service man and even with the Navy as a watchman. But I had to leave that job owing to some of my drinking habits, which certainly did not do me very much good. At that time during these problems, the Reverend Willis who was the minister at Churchill, came to visit me and pray with me in a very wonderful way, even though he did not understand any Eskimo. I thought to myself that I must put my trust in God and love His people. because I did not seem to have very much love for anyone in me. Then I remembered when I was a young man about our Catechist in our own home, named Luke Kidlapik, who was preaching about God's love and even from that memory I felt that God perhaps would want me to work like Luke and minister to God's people. Although I am not a very good man, this call seemed to come to me. It seemed just like a needle sticking in and making me think very much. I also began to think about training and how to help our people and thought that God would lead me in the right way about these things. I know God has promised His Holy Spirit to His people and so I have come here to The Arthur Turner Training School in Pangnirtung to study and learn about God's work. Jesus came to the people on this earth to love them and He went to the Cross for us. And I do want our people all to believe in this truth and to understand it. The training here is not very easy but I know that God is helping me in all of it. I really want to understand the sacred Word of God, especially in these days when our people are having so many problems. It is almost like that God's Word seems weak in the lives of the people, but I pray that they will understand much through my ministry. God is calling us to work together as Christians and to pray for each other and now I close and say goodbye to all Christians everywhere.

Tuesday Prayer Meeting
