#### Our Patron: Christ Church

From time to time parishioners ask who the Patron of our two parishes is, and what function the Patron performs. Briefly, every Benefice (ecclesiastical parish) has a Patron, and his duty is to appoint the incumbent (vicar or rector) to the benefice (or 'Living') which is in his gift. A Patron can be the Bishop of the Diocese (e.g. Bengeworth), or the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral (e.g. Cleeve Prior) a body of Trustees (e.g. Broadway), or the Lord Chancellor, the Crown, an individual or an institution, such as an Oxford or Cambridge college. In the case of Hampton, Offenham, the Littletons, Badsey with Aldington, and Wickhamford, the patron is Christ Church, Oxford ... an institution unique in many ways, but chiefly in being at one and the same time a college of the university and the cathedral of the diocese.

Another unique feature of this institution is that although it is a college, it is never called Christ Church College, and, just to add to the muddle, it is known to its members as 'The House'. Furthermore, its Fellows are called Students, and its students are called undergraduates. If such perversity should exasperate you, perhaps you will not be at all surprised to hear that one of its Students in the last century was the mathematics don, the Reverend Charles Dodgson, alias Lewis Carroll, author of 'Alice in Wonderland'.

A Patron, it can be said, only acts when a vacancy occurs in a benefice, and then his duty is confined to presenting a candidate of his choice to the Bishop for institution to that parish. We are lucky that our Patron, Christ Church, does not interpret the function of patronage so narrowly. Over the past century Christ Church has contributed generously to this benefice in a number of ways. For example, when in the 1860s the then Lord of the Manor of Badsey, Mr. Wilson, put up for sale by auction the Churchyard, which through some quirk of history belonged to the Lord of the Manor rather than to the Vicar, it was Christ Church who gave the Reverend Thomas Hunt the purchase price. Later in the last century Christ Church purchased for the bene-fice a field adjacent to the old vicarage; the same field which seventy years later was to become the site and garden of the new vicarage, the building of which was aided by a substantial grant from the same benefactor. Wickhamford, too, has benefited in the past in various ways from its patron.

In recent years our Patron has developed the excellent tradition of organising for its clergy (about eighty of us) a conference at Christ Church every two years, and during the three days of the conference we enjoy not only the stimulus of the lectures, but also the generous hospitality of the college.

I am writing this because I believe that we owe Christ Church a debt of gratitude, and there may be many parishioners who are not aware of that debt. But I am also concerned that as many parishioners as possible should be informed about the important part that some patrons play in the well-being of the parishes of our Church. From time to time voices are raised in the General Synod asking for the abolition of private patronage in the Church of England. The argument for abolition is that private patronage is an ancient anomaly which stops the Bishop (or his advisors) from appointing his own candidates to a vacant Living, and is therefore a hindrance to 'Diocesan Strategy' (whatever that may be).

However, there are many of us who would not want to trade the real benefits of an ancient anomaly for the imagined and perhaps illusory advantages of a diocesan strategy.

#### Obituary

The Reverend Jeffrey Graham Jeffreys, who was Vicar of Badsey and Wickhamford, 1945-1947, has died recently, aged 84 years. Before his appointment to our parishes, Mr. Jeffreys had been Vicar of St. Mary's, Tottenham. Later, he held the living of Chesterfield with Wendlebury (1953-1959).

Jeremiah Salisbury, who has died at the age of 84 years, retired to Badsey some years ago, where he lived with his wife and sister-in-law in Binyon Close.

Walter Bell came from the Bell family long associated with Aldington. His grandfather, William Bell, was Mr. Savory's bailiff at the Manor farm, and appears in the pages of Mr. Savory's book, 'Grain and chaff from an English Manor'. Mr. Bell, who had been a market gardener all his life, fell ill about a year ago and died at Evesham hospital.

Kathleen Tandy, who was born in Evesham seventy years ago, came to live in the old Silk Mills more than forty years ago.
