Ceremonies

How dull life would be without ceremony! Just think of it...no doffing one's hat, no kissing under the mistletoe, no processions, no parades, no cheering the hero, no village Fete, no hissing the villain, no galas, no tournaments, no Trooping the Colour, no Christmas Stockings, no Bonfire Night...well, the list is endless.

Hop-Scotch

Much of life is embellished by ritual. Look at the small children as they dance hop-scotch in the pattern of chalk squares on the pavement. Unaware of what they're doing, and without any interference or instruction from the adult world, they tread out a measure which is partly game, partly dance, and partly pagan ritual.

Cricket

Look at a batsman as he prepares to race the first ball. He arrives at the wicket; he scowls quickly at the infield; he crouches down into the batting position; he strikes the ground with his bat a number of times like a stag pawing the ground before a dual (sometimes he moves forward a few yards up the pitch and strikes the ground again); he stands up straight again and pivots slowly round on his heel, glaring defiantly at the fielders and flourishing his bat a few times as if to test its balance or to strike fear into his foe; he crouches down once more into the batting position and then, after a few more preliminary fidgets, he raises his eyes and stares at the bowler, who receives this signal and now, at last, begins his run. However dull the innings may become, the batman has given the spectators a delightful 'curtain-raiser' which like much of our national game owes more to our innocent desire for drama than to the dull practicalities of bat and ball.

Worship

It is not at all surprising that this desire for drama should find expression in our forms of Worship. Cricket has its own ritual language and costume, and its own ceremonial, without which the game would be only half the fun. This is also true of Religion. Our worship is a corporate celebration enacted in dramatic terms. We use music, recitation, movement, costume, posture as our way of praising God. I suppose we could simply all go to Church, say 'Glory be to the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit,' and then spend the next half hour silently pondering those words before getting up to return home. As an act of worship that would be logical...but it would fall a long way short of being a Celebration.

Ritual is also part of our private devotion, or, at least, it can be. Thomas Browne, that eminently seventeenth century physician whose common sense on matters of religion was such a refreshing contrast to the bigotry of his times, puts it as well as anyone when he writes: 'At my Devotion I love to use the civility of my knee,

my hat and my hand.'

One of the Ceremonies traditionally associated with Maundy Thursday is the Stripping of the Altar. At Badsey immediately after the Eucharist on Maundy Thursday evening the Altar and Sanctuary are stripped of their ornaments and furnishing. Whilst this is being done, the congregation recite Psalm 22. The Action and the Words alike prepare us for the stark mood of Gethsemane and Calvary. After the ceremony the congregation disperses in silence.

Easter Vigil

There are many ancient ceremonies belonging to the Vigil of Easter. Two of these I would like to introduce this year at Badsey: The Lighting of the Paschal Candle and the Renewal of Baptismal Vows. The service will begin at 8 p.m. on Holy Saturday and will fall into three sections. First there will be readings from the Old Testament and the New, recalling God's promise of Redemption; during this part of the service the Church will be in darkness, except for the light at the lectern. Then after the Readings will come the Ceremony of Lighting the Paschal Candle, from which smaller candles will be lit and distributed among the congregation, thereby symbolising the Light of the Risen Lord shining through the darkness of death. In the final part of the service the congregation will be invited to renew their Baptismal Promises.

Some of you are familiar with these ceremonies and will I am sure agree that they are potent symbols of the Faster Gospel. Would you recommend this service to your friends, and may I invite those of you in both parishes who may not be familiar with the Easter Vigil Ceremonies to come along and join us in Badsey Church on Holy Saturday (Easter Eve) at 8 p.m.
