VISIT OF THE BISHOP TO THE DEANERY OF EVESHAM

Our Bishop, the Rt. Revd. Robin Woods, will be spending a week end in the Deanery at the end of April. On the Friday evening (April 28th) he will attend a meeting of the Deanery Synod. On Saturday evening he will be attending a reception for P.C.C. officers and their spouses at Bengeworth Church House, and will have an opportunity to meet lay representatives of the parishes. On Sunday he will attend and preach at sundry services in different parts of our Deanery, finishing at Offenham Parish Church for the Combined Evensong of our local churches.

Help for the Homeless

A recent article in the Evesham Journal highlighted the need for accommodation for people leaving our local Children's Home and from Powick Hospital.

Peewit Road Children's Home in Hampton cares for 17 children between the ages of 5 and 18. Like other children, when they leave school, they look for jobs. At 18 they are officially out of care, but long before that we begin a search for lodgings in the community, if they have no parental home to go to.

By contrast, people leaving Powick Hospital, who have no homes of their own, vary in age from teens to sixties. Mental illness can often help create rifts in marriages, or with families and friends. These people can find that they are on their own with nowhere to go, and no one who can be riend them. Without lodgings some are unable to leave hospital, even though they are well.

What is needed in both these cases are warm, caring people who feel that they can offer time and understanding, and most importantly a room. Anyone who takes on the job needs to be a little special, because the task is not easy. There are hard times and disappointments, but there are also the joys of watching and helping people to stand on their own two feet.

Lodgings are needed now for John who is 18, and on a Course at Pershore Horticultural College. He is quiet, but although fairly self-sufficient, needs to have someone to whom he can talk.

Lyn is 17½. She used to attend the Vale of Evesham Educationally Sub-normal School and now goes to the Adult Training Centre in Evesham. She is able to look after herself but needs some supervision and encourage-

June is 58, and suffering from a recurring mental ithress, which requires hospitalization from time to time. When she is well, she is a warm kind but quiet person. Her marriage has recently broken up, so she now needs somewhere to live.

Joyce aged 48, was harrassed by her landlord when he found out that she needed to go into Powick Hospital. She is naturally unhappy in her bedsit because of this. She is completely self-sufficient, but very quiet and very nervous with other people.

Of course the lodgings problem is not one that will be solved if we find accommodation for these four people It is one that will continue over the years.

Our commitment will be to help and advise wherever there are problems. Are you able to make a commitment by offering lodgings?

Badsey Annual Parish Meeting, March 9th

There were about two dozen parishioners present at the Annual Meeting in the Remembrance Hall. Mr. Hatcher was in the Chair. Among the subjects which were discussed was the proposed alteration to the Bread Charity.

The Clerk showed us the definitive map of public rights of way in the parish, and it was suggested that these ancient paths with some of their old names be made more widely known, especially to the up and coming generation and to those who have moved recently into the village. The Clerk reminded us that only the paths marked on the definitive map are public rights of way, and that a footpath marked on an O.S. map need not necessarily be a public footpath.

The Meeting discussed the names proposed for part of the new development West of the High Street (continuation of Seward Road); the majority favoured the suggestion that the spur be called after the local name of the piece of land, 'The Knapp'. Complaints were made about damage to the Recreation Ground: a stand pipe had been severed at its base, and horses had been ridden

across the ground, cutting up the turf. The Social Committee who had organised a Bonfire and Firework display, and other fund raising activities, had offered to give a slide to the village, to be placed on the Recreation Ground. The Parish Councillors were thanked for the work they had done on behalf of the Parish during the past year.

Aldington Parish Meeting

This was a cosy little meeting ... four residents of Aldington were present and one of Badsey. Mr. Wadams was in the chair. Matters discussed included the Bread Charity, footpaths, and the tipping of rubbish in the spinney near the Evesham – Badsey road. It was reported that Mr. Gorham had offered to donate a tree; a prunus tree to be planted in Chestnut Close. Complaints were received about lorries running over the grass verges in the main street.

Aldington and Badsey Bread Charity

In the latter part of the seventeenth century, about three hundred years ago, five local worthies (three of Aldington, two of Badsey) left a sum of £43 as an investment to provide bread for the poor of the parish. The money was used to buy sundry pieces of land lying dispersed in the Common Fields of the Parish. The income was used (according to a decision of the trustees in 1702) to buy nine 'great loaves' at Christmas and nine more at Easter. The nine loaves cost a total of four shillings and three-pence.

In 1812 an Act of Parliament was passed enclosing the Common Fields of Badsey, and by the terms of this Act the various pieces of Charity land were exchanged for the nine acres of land at Bowers Hill known either as 'The Old Leys' or as 'Poors Land'. During the nineteenth century the twice yearly distribution of bread was increased, loaves being given at Whitsuntide and St. Jamestide as well as at Christmas and Easter.

Until 1907 the administration of the Charity appears to have been the duty of the churchwardens, but after this date the Charity Commission ordered that the Parish Council nominate two trustees, bringing the number to four

For some years now the trustees have felt that the terms of the Trust are too narrow and not really appropriate to the contemporary life. We have asked the Charity Commissioners to draw up a new scheme enabling the fund to be distributed in other forms than loaves of bread. This they have done, and in due time the Bread Charity will be replaced by a Relief in Need Charity (the draft scheme was available for inspection during March as published on the Notice Boards in the two villages).

The Trustees hope that the new arrangements will allow a much more flexible working of the Charity and that it will meet the approval of the founders of this Trust who, no doubt, are looking down with interest upon our plans, and whose names are:
