Easter

Lent came and went this year astonishingly quickly, or so it seemed at the time, and Easter was upon us almost before we had put away the posies of Mothering Sunday. The Easter Day Eucharist in both Churches were well attended, and our worship was assisted by the beautiful floral decoration so lavishly prepared by the ladies of the two Sanctuary Guilds. The services in Holy Week were well attended; in particular the Good Friday Morning Service at Wickhamford, the Tuesday Evensong at Badsey and the Easter Eve Service at Badsey. Hardly anyone came to the Good Friday Morning Service at Badsey, except the choir who turned up in strength, but the afternoon service was more popular. I think that next year we will have at Badsey just the afternoon and evening services on Good Friday. The choir at Badsey did well to come to services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Eve and Easter Day (twice), and deserve a word of praise.

Ascension Day

We celebrate this important festival on Thursday, May 4th. Being a working day it often gets overlooked as one of the major days of the Christian Calendar, and undoubtedly some of us will find it difficult to attend. Church on the Thursday. However, there is a choice of service: 8 a.m. at Wickhamford, or 7 p.m. at Badsey. With a little effort most of our congregation could attend one or other of these services...with a little effort.

What's in a Name

'What's in a name? That which we call a rose By any other name would smell as sweet.

Or so Juliet would have us believe. Alas, as she later discovered, there was much more than she supposed in a name, or at least in the two names of Montagu and Capulet. Enough to inflict tragedy upon herself and Romeo. On a far less serious level there's enough in names to insure that their frequent misuse can inflict... well, not tragedy, but a great deal of inconvenience and misunderstanding. For example, the Spring Holiday is not Whit. The Spring Bank Holiday is the last Monday in May. The Spring Bank Holiday is the last Monday this year falls on May 14th. The constant confusion of these two quite distinct events is as muddling as it is inexcusable.

The Eucharist

While on the subject of nomenclature, may I suggest that for the sake of brevity and clarity these services which are Eucharistic appear in our schedule under the which are Eucharistic appear in our schedule under the single name: The Eucharist. Over the years the Church of England has collected a vast number of different names for the same service: The Lord's Supper, Holy Communion, Parish Communion, Family Communion, Sung Eucharist, etc. I have been partly guilty in continuing this tradition of verbiage, and propose to mend my ways by referring from now on in this magazine to the service by the single name. The word 'Eucharist' derives from the Greek word for Thanksgiving, and refers to the central Prayer of the service as well as to the dominant feature of the worship. Whether the service is said or sung should be a matter of common sense.

Social Evening

Please take note of the various notices of forthcoming social events. The Cream Teas at Wickhamford sound mouth-watering, and the Brownies Concert in Badsey should be fun. The Coffee Evening at Mr. and Mrs. Sears' house (May 19th) is always an enjoyable occasion. A new event in our social calendar is the party in Mr. Willcox's garden at Aldington (June 2nd, 7-30 p.m.) which I am sure will be equally enjoyable.
