I'm a blackbird who has recently found living accommodation for my wife and myself in a hollow tree trunk in the grounds of the Memorial Hall at Wickhamford. I decided on this particular tree because of the peace and quiet surrounding it — an ideal place to raise a family.

On Easter Sunday morning a large coach arrived, packed to the roof with beds, sleeping bags, buckets and mountains of food - plenty of crumbs for us. Out and mountains of food – pienty of crumbs for us. Out poured small figures dressed in brown, chattering excitedly like starlings, and rather larger bluebirds, who were their leaders. They were all singing together – just like us – and sounded very happy and cheerful. My wife decided that they looked as if they would be good neighbours, and watched their movements closely, as neighbours do, for the next few days.

After 'Grizzly Bear' had helped them all put up their beds, one small group went into the kitchen and re-appeared shortly afterwards with a turkey lunch - which disappeared just as quickly.

During the afternoon we followed the Brownies to our local Church, where they helped to swell the congrega-tion by sitting in the box pews and raising their voices in song.

On Monday they lived up to our expectations in neighbourliness, and hung up a bag of nuts for all our friends.

Many outings were made by the group to the local farm, the Dog Kennels run by the Canine Defence Leage, and even a walk into Evesham to do their gift shopping for their families.

Every time anyone visited these humans in residence, they were asked to walk down an aisle of brown figures, who sang a Burmese welcome. They all seemed to be enjoying themselves, although the words varied each

On the last night our lawn was invaded by the Brownies who had been told that as the Hall was already booked for that evening, they would have to sleep outside! They all reserved their space except one, who was determined that she was not sleeping under the open sky! We all had a good laugh when we found out the whole thing had been a joke played by their leaders.

They just got all the beds back in time, to watch "Tom and Jerry", in a surprise film show, given by a generous local shopkeeper.

Friday, we all said "Goodbye" to our friends after a good holiday, marred only by 15 out of the 19 Brownies suffering from a tummy bug, which needed a visit from the local Doctor.
