The World Council of Churches and the

'Patriotic Front'

Many of us were greatly alarmed to read that the World Council of Churches had recently decided, through its Combat of Racism Fund, to donate £45,000 to the Rhodesian Guerrilla movement called the 'Patriotic Front'.

The figure may not be large, but the principle of lending, or appearing to lend, moral approval to what is patently a murderous organisation has drawn widespread condemnation from Church leaders of different denominations in this country.

What are the facts? So far as I can understand them they are as follows: the World Council of Churches is made up of a number of National Councils (e.g. the British Council of Churches), and each National Council is made up of local bodies (e.g the Evesham Council of Churches), and each local Council is made up of representatives from all the 'mainstream' Christian denominations, excluding the R.C.s. The whole movement is aimed at encouraging better relations between the different denominations, and, where possible, at speaking with a united voice on matters of National or International concern.

The Programme to Combat Racism draws its money from a special fund set up for this purpose. Since 1970, when it was started, it has made grants to 82 agencies in 26 countries, the grants to be used for peaceful purposes. None of this money has come from the ordinary funds donated by British Churches, nor from ordinary collections of parish churches. Donations to the Combat of Racism Fund are made directly at the expressed wish of the individual or corporate donor.

Not one penny of yours donated to Church funds in Badsey and Wickhamford has ever found its way into the WCC Combat of Racism Fund, or will ever do so.

However, even though none of our money has been diverted into this dubious fund, I believe that we are still right to protest against the folly of W.C.C. in its apparent desire to give terrorism a seal of approval.

If you feel incensed about this and wish to protest, may I suggest that you temper your anger with the knowledge that most of the British Churches which make up the membership of the British Council of Churches, have already protested vigorously and publicly. At the next meeting of the P.C.C.s of our two parishes a motion will be put deploring the grant of £45,000 to the Rhodesian terrorists, and if the motion is carried I have no doubt that a copy will be sent to the secretary of the British Council of Churches.

Divorce and Re-marriage in Church

For some years now there has been a growing movement in the Anglican Church to allow a second marriage to take place in Church after a previous marriage has been dissolved and while both parties of the first marriage are still alive. The debate has been fairly conducted, with the arguements evenly matched. My own private hope was that our own branch of the Anglican Church (the C of E) would follow the lead of other Provinces (such as the Church of Canada) and allow such second marriages in Church to happen. It has always seemed to me that where a sacred vow has been made and then has later been found to be untenable, there should be some means by which the divorced parties can be released from their original vow. I do not think that to do would necessarily devalue the doctrine of Christian Marriage.

However, at the recent General Synod of the Church of England, a proposal to allow second marriages in church was narrowly defeated. It is therefore unlikely that there will be a change in our discipline on marriage in the near future. That being the case, the overwhelming majority of C of E clergy will not conduct second marriages. Whatever some clergy may think about the General Synod's decision, we are not ordained to parade our private views, but to administer the ordinances of the Church and to do so under the authority of our Bishop, to whom we are bound by an oath of canonical obedience. Although there are some clergy who do perform second marriages (in defiance of the present Church ruling) they are a very small minority, and they act in the knowledge that they are breaking one of their Ordination Vows.

Prayers in Church

A committee of lay people from the congregation at Badsey who have been looking at the subject of Worship have come up with a suggestion that members of the congregation should be provided with suitable prayers to be said privately before and during the Eucharist. What they have in mind is a duplicated sheet with brief prayers that can be used, for example, before going up to the Altar to receive Holy Communion or after receiving. They have also suggested that some people would value a short collection of well known prayers for private use...ones which could perhaps be learnt by heart. I hope to do something about this during September.

Praying in Church

During August when my family and I were staying with triends in Kent, I went to Canterbury to look at the Cathedral. It so happened that there was a service being broadcast that afternoon and the tourists were politely asked not to enter the Cathedral during the service unless they wished to worship...a reasonable enough request which most of the visitors took in good part. However, there were some highly disgruntled tourists who were much displeased by what they took to be an unwarranted interference with their sightseeing programme. All of which goes to show how easy it is to forget that the prime purpose of a church building, be it Canterbury Cathedral or Wickhamford or Badsey Parish Church, is not to be looked at, but to be used.

Now, here's a thought worth considering: if you find it difficult to pray during the bustle of workaday living, why not take up the habit of visiting your parish church on a weekday. Five minutes once a week spent like this, in prayer, or simply sitting still and recollecting the Presence of God (wordless prayer) may be just the tonic you need to revitalise your spiritual life. Some of you, I know, already do this and have over the years derived much benefit. Others might like to try. In Badsey and Wickhamford the Parish Churches are open every day. They are there to be used.
