The Revised Lectionary

On October 28th there came into force the Revised Lectionary. This provides the Readings and Psalms for Sunday and Weekday Worwhip. It replaces, amongs other texts, the Collects, Epistles and Gospels appointed by the Book of Common Prayer (the 1662 Book) to be read at the Eucharist. The new Collects are in most cases the same as the old ones, but with a slight alteration in the wording. In some cases the old Collects are used on different Sundays than previously.

A Theme for each Sunday

What's the advantage? The new arrangement gives us a definite theme for each Sunday; a theme which runs through the whole day's worship, morning and evening. For example, the theme for the five Sundays before Advent Sunday are: The Creation, The Fall, The Election of God's People (Abraham), The Promise of Redemption (Moses), The Remnant of Israel. It can be seen that these topics prepare the way for the great theme of Advent, the Coming of Christ. Thus the range of Readings throughout the year will conform to a scheme which proclaims the Gospel. Under the former arrangement, there were many Sundays where no connecting theme in the Epistle and Gospel was clearly obvious, and when the lessons at Morning and Evening Prayer seemed to be chosen without any link with the rest of the day's worship or with each other.

The 'Lesser' Saints' Days

Another advantage of the New Lectionary is that it provides for the commemoration of many great men and women of the English Church who received no mention in the former Lectionary. People like William Wilberforce (July 29th), John Wyclif (December 31st), George Herbert (February 27th) and Thomas Cranmer (March 21st).

Elsewhere in this issue of the Review there appears a schedule of the themes and readings for the Sundays in December. I include it because I know that some of you like to prepare for your Sunday worship by reading the Epistle and Gospel at home.

Saints in December

St Francis Xavier (1506-52) was, with his friend Ignatius Loyola, a founder member of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits). After ordination, and having already taken vows of poverty and chastity, Francis left his native Spain to preach the Gospel in the Far East. For ten years until his death in 1552 he travelled widely in India, Ceylon and other parts of the Far East, making thousands of converts and establishing the Christian Church in those lands. He is regarded as one of the great missionaries of all time. His day falls on December 3rd.

St Nicholas of Myra (probably third century), much venerated in the Greek and Russian Church, little is known about this Bishop from Asia Minor. Legend tells of his kindness to children, which explains the tradition of his bringing gifts to children on his feast day (December 6th). 'Santa Claus' is a corruption of 'Saint Nicholas'. He is also the patron saint of sailors, and churches under his dedication are often built so that their towers could be seen off the coast as landmarks for navigation. Another

legend tells how Nicholas gave three purses of gold coins to provide the dowry for three girls; it is those three purses which became the shop sign of pawn-brokers.

John Wycliffe (1329-84) was an Oxford scholar, priest and controversial preacher and writer. His opinions brought him into conflict with Papal authority, not only for their critical view of ecclesiastical wealth and corruption, but also for the vehemence of their expression. He taught that every literate Christian should have access to the Sriptures and that the Bible should be available in English translation. For his opinions he has been called 'The Morning Star of the Reformation', but the effect of his writings upon the English Church has probably been exaggerated. The English translation of the Bible, which was done by Wycliffe's followers and based upon the Latin Vulgate instead of upon the original Greek and Hebrew, was condemned by ecclesiastical authority. A Balliol man, Wycliffe seems to have possessed all the vigour of a reformer, but little of the gentleness of a pastor.

Badsey Church Notice Board

The new Notice Board outside the Church has been constructed by one of the churchwardens, Mr Ralph Taylor, and painted by Mr John Bird. We are very grateful for such a welcome improvement, as the former board was beginning to look rather dilapidated.

Wickhamford Church Wall

Some months ago the west wall of the churchyard was repaired by two of our parishioners, and is now looking much tidier. We are most grateful to Mr D.Noyes and Mr D.Speake.
