

THE VICAR'S LETTER

December 1982

My dear Friends,

This Christmas we are to welcome to the Christmas Carol Service on the evening of Sunday, December 19th, at St. James' Badsey, the new Bishop of Worcester and Mrs. Goodrich. This will be their first visit to the parish of Badsey with Aldington. May I take this opportunity to say how pleased we shall be to have the Bishop and Mrs. Goodrich with us on this occasion and hope that many members of the church and parish will be present to make this a truly joyous and happy beginning to the festive season. The details of all the Christmas services both at Badsey, and St. John the Baptist, Wickhamford appear elsewhere in the magazine.

At Christmas we celebrate again the coming of Jesus Christ into the world, born as a babe in the manger at Bethlehem, to Mary and Joseph. The one who came in fulfillment of the holy scriptures, that God himself would come and visit his people to restore and heal the broken and fractured relationships between himself and all his children. The promise that through Christ, through faith and belief on his Name, mankind would be restored to fullness of life and born anew in the power of the Holy Spirit. In God's undying and steadfast love for us and all his children, we would be reconciled to him and to each other. A love that was to be perfectly

revealed by Christ himself upon the Cross of Calvary.

Almost 2000 years have passed since that night in Bethlehem. Alternative Service Book

At their recent meeting both PCCs gave consideration to the possible introduction of certain services from the Alternative Service Book now available for use by the Church of England. This will become particularly relevant when the authority for the Series II form of Eucharist, at present in use by both parishes expires in December 1985.

Wickhamford PCC agreed that certain occasional offices, the Marriage and Funeral Services from the ASB should be made available in booklet form, and that further consideration would be given to the Eucharist after members of the PCC have had an opportunity to study the Rite A and

Rite B forms of service from the ASB, also in booklet form.

Badsey PCC made a very similar decision, in that it agreed that further consideration should be given to this matter after the members of the PCC have had the opportunity to study both Rite A and Rite B forms of the Eucharist as well as the Marriage and Funeral services, also in booklet form. The newer forms of the Rite A and Rite B Eucharist service are shortly to be introduced at Badsey for an experimental period beginning with some of the occasional mid-week services, pending a final decision being taken. The Rite A form of Eucharist is very similar to the previous Series III service and uses the modern language form, whereas the Rite B Eucharistic service is almost identical with the Series II form of service at present in use, and preserves the more traditional language.

Also there are the Diocesan Listening Posts (ours is in Worcester at St. Nicholas Church every Wednesday 10.00 am until 1.00 pm). People with family problems are invited to talk them over in confidence with specially trained members. Then there is the "Away from it All" scheme. Mothers on their own or with children who need a holiday are invited by members in certain areas to stay in their homes or are lent caravans. More than 500 holidays are given each year. The Committee also sends evidence to Government Commissions, Committees and Working Parties on various matters affecting the family. Much is being done and this is a very small selection from the matters covered.

A Contribution from our Reader, Mr. John Callaghan

When asked if I would write a piece for our Parish Magazine I was a bit apprehensive. The "Regular Parishioners" may not like it and think I was getting a bit above myself. From another point of view - was this really the Reader's job, or part of his Office?

This gave me the idea. To answer a question you must all have asked many

times "What are Readers and what are they supposed to do?"

Well, let's get it quite clear: A Reader is certainly not a priest, a substitute vicar or an unpaid parson. There are many things he cannot do - he cannot administer any of the sacraments save Baptism and assist at the Eucharist; and he cannot give a blessing or pronounce absolution.

His Office goes back to the earliest days of the Church when - like now, but for different reasons - there were not enough "ordained" ministers to attend the needs of all the congregations. The Apostles appointed seven categories of lay worker to assist. Exorcist, Door Keeper, Lector were among them - so were Readers.

After many centuries all these Offices gradually fell into abeyance, but in 1865/66, to meet a very real need, the Office of Reader was reintroduced.

It is this revised Office which continues today.

It is my own opinion that, for far too long, the attitude of the Church has been "Oh! He (or she) can't do that - he has not got the "Authority". Let's be realistic. With a Church still desperately in need of all the help it can get surely our attitude should be "Let's see what he (she) can do". Then utilise everyones talents to the full.

I consider my Office as Reader should call upon me to assist our Vicar, Peter, in any way he may require. And, to be available to God's people in this place should they feel I can help them in any way. Do not be too shy to ask if you

ever feel you need me.

As Saint Paul tells us - we are all members of one body like arms and legs - each with its own function to perform.
