

THE VICAR'S LETTER

January 1985

My dear Friends,

As we look back over 1984 what are our memories of the year? The miners strike? The bombing at Brighton? Three million unemployed with no positive purpose in life? The events at York Minster and Durham? Or perhaps it is the international scene. The peace demonstrations, the terrible events in India or the victims of the Ethiopian famine. We might be forgiven if we were to ask the question once more, "When comes the promised time, That war shall be no more, And lust, oppression, crime shall flee thy face before?"

January 18th marks the beginning of another Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. I do not wish to reiterate the causes of controversy that sadly seem to divide both our church and our nation at this time. They are familiar to us all. What is needed now are policies and leadership that unite us again, that draw us back together as a church and as a nation. Many people feel that they have had enough of controversy, conflict and strife. We have no wish or desire to be divided into separate classes, the haves and the have nots, the rich and the poor, the north and the south, the elite and the proletariat. We want to be what we have always sought to be, one nation, one people and one church, all contributing to the good of each other and we would like to see this extended to the international scene as well, with much deeper understandings between peoples of differing races, colours and creeds.

We must not despair. As Christians we believe in a God who is still active in his world and in the lives of those who believe on his name. We believe in a God who still loves and cares for all his children, and whose will is that they should know and love him as their Father in heaven. We still believe in a God who through Jesus his Son and through faith in him is able to save us from our sins and the sins of others. From all those things that so easily despoil and mar our lives.

Last October Badsey successfully completed the re-slating of its church roofs at a cost of just under £20,000 of which £16,000 has already been raised. Wickhamford is on the verge of completing a very specialised and expert task of restoration to its Stuart Royal Arms. This has required a budget estimate of £8000 most of which has had to be found from outside the parish.

In their different ways both have been considerable acts of faith as well as most responsible commitments. Some might question whether such work should have been undertaken at all but God can still use material means to teach us spiritual lessons. I think we can be more than thankful for the way both parishes have been seen through them so far. Let them also be a sign. A sign of what God can still accomplish through

those willing to put their faith and trust in Him. And let us extend this same willingness and faith not only to our material needs but to our spiritual needs as well, for the two are really one. The needs of our church, our nation and ourselves. Let this be our hope and promise for 1985.
