

My dear Friends.

People sometimes wonder why it was our Lord did not choose very clever people to be his first disciples, the first witnesses of his life, teaching and ministry, and later his death and resurrection from the dead. We know that his leading disciples came from humble stock. They were fishermen from Galilee and one was a tax collector. In the Acts of the Apostles we read how after Pentecost, the rulers, the elders and the scribes together with the high priest saw the boldness of Peter and John and perceived that they were uneducated, common men. In John's gospel we read how earlier the Jews had marvelled even at Jesus, when they asked "How is it that this man has learning, when he has never studied?". At the age of twelve when Jesus was found in the Temple, sitting among the teachers listening to them and asking them questions, we read how they were amazed at his understanding and answers.

At the recent debate in the Evesham Deanery Synod on the future ministry of the Church of England we learnt something of the selection procedures used in choosing of men and women for the full time minstry of the church. Rather amazingly we heard that sometimes it is possible for a person to be too clever for the work likely to be required of them. How such a person may have very real difficulty in understanding the more ordinary people to whom they would have to minister, and the people may have similar difficulty in relating to them.

Jesus has been described as the one true catholic minded man. Catholic, that is in the sense of, universal interest to all people, all embracing, broad minded and tolerant. The one man, the one person able to rise above the limitations of his own age and time, class, country, or even temperament. There can be no doubt that Jesus was the divine wisdom of God incarnate, and that he possessed an understanding far beyond that of natural man, yet at the same time he was one to whom all could come and find love, healing and new life.

The ministry of the church today is being increasingly shared by the clergy and laity alike. For it to be effective, like the example of our Lord's own ministry, it must become truly catholic. First by the deepening of our own understanding of the faith and secondly, by being a ministry to which others may come without reserve and without hesitation, to find healing, love, forgiveness and new life in the presence of our Risen Lord.
