

My dear Friends,

At its next meeting on September 17th, Badsey PCC will decide on the future use of the Rite A and Rite B forms of service from the Alternative Service Book. This follows an experimental use of both forms of service which began in January 1984. It has to be a joint decision between the incumbent and the PCC.

I think it is fair to say that so far no clear cut view has emerged in support of either form of service. There are those who prefer Rite A and those who prefer Rite B. There are also those who are quite happy with both. Were the PCC to come to a unanimous and near unanimous decision regarding the sole use of either Rite A or Rite B for the Eucharist services, then as the incumbent, I would be quite happy to agree with this, but failing such a decision, I think it would be unwise to abandon either form of service completely.

With this in mind, all regular worshipping parishioners are invited to make their views known about this matter either to myself or to members of the PCC before the meeting in September. This may be done verbally or in writing, and it must be borne in mind that we shall be concerned with all the Eucharist services, that is the 8.00 am said service, the 11.00 am and 6.30 pm sung service, as well as the mid week services, together with the major festivals.

I would also like to add some helpful guidance on this subject from a recent Worship and Doctrine leaflet entitled 'A Guide to Parishes'. It says, "As already indicated, the law provides that the decision to use one form of service rather than another is to be a joint decision of incumbent and parochial church council. The decision may be that a particular form of service should be used for a specified period of time or that it should be used indefinitely". "In taking their decision the incumbent and the parochial church council need to remember that they have to bear in mind the interests and the needs of the parish as a whole. They should give particular attention to the views and needs of those who come to church regularly, and if there are differences of view they should seek wherever possible to find a solution that meets the widest range of needs which is possible and practicable. They should also bear in mind those who come to church occasionally e.g. at major festivals. They should also consider how far any differences of view within the parish relate to the language of worship". "There is a need for sympathetic understanding and generosity in the taking of decisions. If there is a minority of any size within a parish the attempt should be made to cater for it. There is a special need

for generosity in respect of Sunday worship. This may mean the adoption of a mixed pattern of services. It may mean more gradual change than some would like, or some change where the majority would prefer none. Where the incumbent and the parochial church council are aware of unhappiness amongst some parishioners in respect of the pattern of worship which is being adopted it will generally be found to be helpful to set a term to any agreement which they make so that there can be the assurance of review and further discussion".

You will agree, I'm sure, that this gives the incumbent and a PCC a considerable range of options, so please make your views known to us if possible with your reasons. If there are certain aspects of one of the forms of service you do not like such as the hand shake and sign of the peace in Rite A do not be afraid to say so. Certain parts of both services are optional. What we want to do, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, is to come to a decision, or decisions, to which the majority can agree and feel they will be able to support. Although our forms of service may differ we must all be united in our worship, and in our love and service of the Lord.
