

THE VICAR'S LETTER

April 1986

My dear Friends,

Keep Sunday Special

A total of 83 parishioners in both parishes signed the petition against the present government proposals for the complete de-regulation of Sunday trading, 56 in Badsey, and 27 in Wickhamford. These numbers represent 45% of the church electoral roll in Badsey and 36% in Wickhamford. It is understood that nationally, the government has been taken aback by the opposition received to the proposals, some 32,000 letters having been sent to members of parliament. At the time of writing, the introduction of the Bill to the House of Commons has been put back one week to allow for further reconsideration. The outcome may already be decided by the time this Parish Review is published.

But whatever the outcome, we should always remember keeping Sunday special is one very distinct and unique way in which the Christian Church and Christians bear witness to the love of Christ and the gospel of Christ in the midst of the world around them. It is one way in which the Church maintains its own distinctive identity in the face of mounting apathy, the pursuit of more material and worldly interests and even other faiths.

The way each one of us chooses to keep Sunday, is a matter for our own consciences, both personally, and as a society and a nation. It is a freedom of conscience that must always be preserved and respected as much as possible. If not, then people will be prevented from enjoying full communion with Christ and fellowship with one another, that is Christ's will for his church, and the only sure foundation upon which we believe the life and well being of the nation itself can be built.

In a country still avowedly Christian, and of which the Monarch is the supreme governor of the established church, I believe the government of the day has a duty to see that the consciences of christian church going people are respected as far as possible and not made subject to market pressures or more worldly pursuits.

In any parish, there will always be some, often a relatively small number of people who faithfully worship at their church Sunday by Sunday, Few are saints and most would be the first to admit it. Furthermore, it seems they will always be in the minority. Yet it is people such as these who continue to re-present the servant church of Christ to the whole community in that place, throughout the weeks, the months and even the years. It is in them, the light of Christ's gospel, the witness of his love, and the flame of faith is kept alive. Without such a presence these things would surely die. True we would that more would come and share in this mighty task. It will always be the church's mission to proclaim the gospel to the world. We have a gospel to proclaim and of that there must never be any doubt. Because of this I believe those who are called to follow most closely in the footsteps of our Lord, those who wish to become a part of his self-giving. self-sacrificing, servant church today, should, in christian conscience be allowed to do so, and not have further stumbling blocks or temptations placed in their way.

MOTHERS UNION

At our second meeting in February Mr Michael Lloyd spoke to us of a pilot project set up in Evesham to help those who have suffered brain damage. At present this is the only such project in the Country. He told us Acquired Aphasia is a condition arising from brain damage which produces in the person serious disorders of language function. These may involve, in varying degrees, the impairment of use of speech, understanding of the spoken word and the disorganising of reading skills in a formerly literate person. The causes mainly road and riding accidents, drug abuse, shock and stroke.

Volunteer tutors, carefully matched to "students", visit them in their homes. The needs, varied and complex, are met with patience, various

teaching aids and computer technology. He had been amazed at the ability of some of the students (never referred to as patients) in the use of certain computers when they customarily visited the Evesham College of Further Education where the project is operated.

Mr Lloyd's talk was both interesting and informative and he mentioned that anyone seeking help could always contact him at the college.

Our A.G.M. was held on 11th March and, of course, given over to business matters. We were very pleased to have the Vicar with us on this occasion.

We would like to express our thanks for the anonymous donation towards the cost of flowers for the Mothering Sunday posies, to those who gave flowers, greenery and time and Mr Ron Jones for the box of flowers he so kindly supplied. We do appreciate these gifts.

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD P.C.C. A.G.M.

At the Vestry meeting prior to the A.G.M. Mrs Thelma Dunkerley and Mr G. Poulter were elected as Churchwardens for the coming year. Three new members have joined the Electoral Roll since last year, and 12 of the 72 are non residents.

Mr Wadams presented the accounts in the absence of the Treasurer, Mrs B. Astley. He noted that thanks to individuals who gave generously of their time and money there had been sufficient income to meet all expenses and give over £300 to seven charities regularly supported by the church. Worthy of special note were the Cream Teas £915, seventeen covenants providing over £1000 and a similar amount from Collections, together with £508 from the late Mr John Dunkerley's Memorial Service who also left a legacy of £1000. After £2,012 paid in our quota the next greatest expense was £437 for heating and lighting the church.

The Vicar in his report noted a) gifts to the Church, of a chalice, Bible and legacy for which we were deeply grateful. b) The Rite B form of Eucharist had been adopted and accepted. c) The passing of two loyal

and faithful servants Mr John Dunkerley and Mr Clarry Willis.

Mr G. Poulter reported that the Church was in excellent condition despite the severe winter weather. Some economy had been made by regulating the Church heating to the principle times when it was required but he felt the average weekly cost of over £20 could be reduced by the use of Economy 7. Mr Cox had agreed to continue the excellent way in which he keeps the churchyard, Mrs A. Poulter thanked Mrs C. Collis for her help in running a small but active Sunday School.

All P.C.C. members were thanked for their support especially Mrs Astley, Treasurer and Mrs Dunkerley, Secretary.

WICKHAMFORD GARDENING CLUB

At the March meeting, members heard the sad news of the death of Mr R. Clegg, the previous Secretary. Tributes were paid to him by the Chairman and Secretary and it was agreed that a donation be made in his memory. This would be sent to U.R.
