

THE VICAR'S LETTER

March 1987

My dear Friends,

The problem of suffering is one encountered by all of us at some time in our lives. Why does God allow suffering? Few people believe God deliberately inflicts suffering, but the question why it is allowed to happen is one that has troubled and perplexed man throughout his history. The word suffer means simply to allow, to let something happen. We see this meaning in another context when Jesus says, "Suffer the little children to come unto me, for of such is the kingdom of heaven" It is when the disciples try to prevent mothers from bringing their children to Jesus.

In the Old Testament, the book of Job seeks an answer to suffering. The writer engages in a series of dialogues between Job and his friends over Job's misfortunes but finds no real or satisfactory answer. We read, "The Lord answers Job out of a whirlwind. Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge. Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth. Can you bind the chains of the Pleiades, or loose the cords of Orion? or can you guide the Bear with its children? Do you know the ordinances of the heavens? Can you establish their rule on the earth?" The names refer, of course, to constellations in the heavens and signs of the Zodiac. Isaiah expresses similar thoughts when he writes, "Woe to him who strives with his Maker, an earthen vessel with the potter. Does the clay say to him who fashions it, What are you making? or Your work has no handles" and later, "Yet Lord, thou art our Father, we are the clay, and thou art our potter; we are all the work of thy hand" In a slightly

different context Paul uses the same example in his letter to the Romans when he writes, "But who are you, a man, to answer back to God? Will what is molded say to its molder, Why have you made me thus?" The mystery of the Cross and Passion of Jesus is the most profound of all. Why should Jesus die upon the Cross and suffer innocently for the wrongs and sins of others. The wrongs and sins of you and me.

There are perhaps three aspects of suffering, realisation of which might

help us to bear suffering a little more easily when it comes.

First, a realisation, that no matter how much we might wish it were otherwise, life does not seem to be fair. It does not seem fair that one person should be struck down with an incurable disease early in life, however innocently contracted, whilst others, many others, live to enjoy a full and happy life over a normal life span. It does not seem fair, that one person should be seriously injured or even killed in an accident whilst others are not. It does not seem fair that thousands of people in one part of the world should suffer from starvation, malnutrition and disease whilst in another part of the world good, rich fertile agricultural land might be used for other purposes than growing food. Life does not seem fair, and first, I think we have to try and accept this.

Secondly, a realisation that whilst life may not always seem to be fair, there is nevertheless an overall balance between good and bad. Life is not wholly good or wholly bad, but rather an amazing mixture of the two, and overall the balance is towards the good. In other words, life itself, with all its light and shade its hills and valleys is something that is good and not bad. Read again the first chapter of the book of Genesis, and rediscover this profound truth anew. "And God saw everything he had made, and behold it was very good" And there was an evening and a morning, a sixth day."

Thirdly, a realisation that we have to learn to accept life as it is and co-operate with it. By this I do not mean we just sit back and fold our hands and do nothing, but rather that we seek to unlock life's mysteries and understand them and work with them. The scientist, those engaged in medical research, the farmer, the market gardener know this only too well. There is no point in trying to rebel or fight against life, or force it into something other than it is intended to be. Such ways only lead to frustration, disappointment, bitterness and despair. The secret lies in understanding life as it really is and in co-operating and working with it.

Suffering is an inescapable part of life in this world and few of us are spared it. It is the way people bear it that makes the difference. We can rebel against it, and curse our misfortune. Or, with Jesus, in the Garden of Gethsame, on the night before the Crucifixion, we too may pray, "Father if it be thy will, let this cup pass from me, nevertheless not mine but thy will be done" We remember that after the Cross of Suffering there came the glory of the

Resurrection. It is in this faith and hope we ask that the Risen Christ will transform our suffering and hallow it with his presence and abiding love.

The words of John Wesley in one of his hymns expresses this hope so well.

Give to the winds thy fears; Hope, and be undismayed; God hears thy sighs and counts thy tears; God shall lift up thy head.

Through waves and clouds and storms His power will clear the way; Wait thou his time; the darkest night Shall end in brightest day

Leave to his sovereign sway
To choose and to command;
So shalt thou, wondering, own his way,
How wise, how strong his hand.

THE MOTHERS UNION

Our party on the 27th January proved to be a very pleasurable occasion. We were entertained by "A Refugee from Austria" (Mrs Doreen Moore) who read two humerous monologues she had written and "An Improving Tale" read by Mrs Esmé Seaman, which was also most amusing. We then enjoyed a very good buffet supper followed by "Alfredo" (Mr Alfred Perry) who showed us more "magic". We rounded off the evening with Auld lang syne. Our grateful thanks to Mrs Moore and Mrs Seaman and to the two anonymous members whose generosity enabled us to have "Alfredo" with us. Also to all who gave the lovely selection of prizes for the raffle.

On February 10th Station Officer Pearson from the Evesham Headquarters of the Fire Service gave us a most interesting talk. He began by giving us an idea of the number of calls received and of the problem of hoax calls. He told us the first priority of the Fire Service was the saving of life. He explained to us the kind of information needed from a 999 call reminding us how important it was that a clear address and directions be provided, particularly if a house was not numbered, and that details of the type of fire decided what appliances were required. He mentioned the various potential fire hazards in the home and the safest way of dealing with them, stressing in particular that first, in the event of fire, the alarm should be sounded and the house or building evacuated. He pointed out the speed

with which some furniture will burn, the toxic fumes and smoke which are very quickly produced and how vital a closed door can be in keeping back fire. This was a very informative talk which set us all thinking.
