THE VICAR'S LETTER

May 1987

My dear Friends,

Suffering and Deliverance

In a shop window in Worcester recently, I saw a small wooden plaque on which was inscribed, "I asked Jesus how much he loved me. He said, This much, and stretched his arms and died".

The night before his Crucifixion, Jesus shared with his disciples in the Feast of the Passover. This feast, still celebrated today by Jewish people, commemorates the people of Israel's bondage in Egypt under Pharaoh, and their seemingly miraculous deliverance by God when they were led by Moses through the waters of the Red Sea and brought eventually to the threshold of the promised land.

Writing recently on the meaning of the Passover today, Dr Dan Cohn-Sherbok, a Jewish Rabbi said that in every generation, the Jewish people must think of themselves as delivered from a perpetual enemy, and should assume their responsibility of rescuing those who suffer under oppression. He went on, "As God's suffering servant through the ages, the Jewish people should be able to identify with the plight of today's poor; in the light of the Exodus, the Passover, they should feel an obligation to take steps to eradicate poverty and suffering wherever it occurs In all such cases, the Jewish people, who have consistently endured hardship, should feel drawn to the downtrodden of contemporary society, sharing in their

distress". In other words at the Passover, when the Jewish people remember the sufferings of their people under Pharaoh and the deliverance that followed they should remember all who still suffer and are enslaved by sin and wrong. As the writer of the ancient book of Exodus puts it, "You should not wrong a stranger or oppress him for you were strangers in the land of Egypt". (Exodus 22.21). Dr Cohn-Sherbok says, "The Passover ceremony unites the Jewish people with their ancestors who endured slavery and oppression in Egyptian bondage. Despite the persecution of centuries the Jewish nation was confident of eventual deliverance and the ultimate redemption of mankind".

As the new people of God, the new Israel, Christians believe deliverance and redemption has been achieved in Jesus Christ, who was himself a Jew. Certainly Jesus saw himself as the personification of God's suffering servant. One called upon to share in the suffering of his people and take the sufferings of others upon himself. This is expressed in the first of the Easter Anthems, "Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; therefore let us keep the feast".

In the bread and the wine of the Eucharist, representing as they do, the body and blood of Jesus, and the sacrifice of Jesus, Christians realise with thanksgiving (for this is what the Greek word 'eucharist' means) how much Jesus loves them. How much God loves them. How much it costs to effect the salvation of mankind through love. And in this thanksgiving, in this love Christians find an inspiration and strength which enables them to love others and share their sufferings with them. That they too may be saved and delivered from sin and wrong. That all may share in a future and ultimate redemption of mankind. A redemption and deliverance in which Jesus, the one who saves, and those who are his people, Jew and Christian alike, will always have a divinely appointed role.
