

THE VICAR'S LETTER

July 1987

My dear Friends,

There are only two places in the whole of the New Testament where anyone is ever said to laugh, and on both occasions they relate to our Lord. The first is at the raising of Jairus' daughter from the dead, when Jesus says to the people assembled outside the house, "She is not dead but sleeping" and we read the people laugh at him. The second time is at his crucifixion when Jesus is hanging on the Cross. Those who pass by deride him saying "Aha, you who would destroy the Temple and build it in three days, save yourself and come down from the Cross! So also the chief priests with the scribes mock him saying "He saved others, he cannot save himself".

One reason why people laugh is to cover their embarrassment. Another is to conceal a sense of guilt. We may also laugh at another person's sudden loss of dignity or self respect, or even our own. Laughter, together with a sense of humour is a very vital part of a well balanced and well adjusted personality. It is a kind of safety valve that releases pent up feelings and emotions and enables us to keep things in their true and proper perspective.

But ridicule and humiliation is another matter. We should always take great care not to despise the feelings of others together with those things they hold dear. Nothing is more hurtful than to feel something or someone we love and care for deeply is the butt of someone else's ridicule. This is particularly true of a person's religious faiths and beliefs. In the church there was once a very senior and much respected person of whom it was said they very seldom laughed. But afterwards it was discovered this was only to avoid being the cause of any possible hurt to others, especially those who could not respond in like manner.

True joy is one of the great Christian virtues. It has to do with trials bravely born and temptations successfully overcome. At a more profound level it is seen as but an anticipation of a joy that is to come. The joy, the happiness, and I believe, the laughter which awaits us in Christ's heavenly kingdom.

WICKHAMFORD GARDENING CLUB

Windsor Great Park was the venue for Wickhamford Gardening Club's June meeting. Our first visit was to The Savill Garden where we saw a fine collection of Herbaceous Borders, Rose Beds, Raised Beds and a most interesting Dry Bed. For those of us who were suitably shod to tackle the damp conditions underfoot there were also the Peat Beds and, most interesting of all, the Woodland Plantings, where tall Primulas of many hues were associated with lush green ferns and blue Iris, bold plants such as Gunnera and Rheum, and the beautiful blue Mecanopsis (Himalayan Poppy), all set against a backdrop of purple Rhodedendrons. A breathtakingly beautiful sight!

The visit continued on foot through 1 mile of picturesque woodland to The Valley Gardens, some 400 acres of woodland which includes the National Collection of Rhodedendron and Holly species and an extensive collection of Heathers and Dwarf Conifers growing in what once was a gravel pit, and a very bizarre Totem Pole! The famous Punchbowl was unfortunately severely damaged by the winter frosts and the Azaleas have not flowered this year and, indeed, may take up to 5 years to recover their former glory. Our thanks to Mr. Hale who organised this trip and even arranged for the sun to shine!
