

THE VICAR'S LETTER

September 1987

My dear Friends,

Jesus said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the labourers are few, pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into the harvest"

At a recent service of thanksgiving at the Royal Agricultural Society Show at Stoneleigh, Warwickshire, the Archbishop of Canterbury spoke of the present situation facing the church in many rural areas and communities. Referring to the decision to set up a Commission on rural areas similar to that of the Inner Cities he said, "A hatchet job of Beeching proportions has been done on the rural church over the past twenty years, but now your cry has been heard, the time had come to bind up the wounds which had been inflicted" He pinpointed three areas of concern for the church in rural areas. "First", he said, "we have taken away your resident parson, we have sold your rectory, and your glebe, we have quadrupled your quota and introduced and encouraged urban forms of worship. But now the time has come to reflect and ponder and listen to what you have to say about your future".

Rural deprivation was the second point made by the Archbishop. Tackling such poverty was, he said, a difficult problem, because the rural poor were spread around and not gathered together like the urban poor in place or district.

Thirdly there was the church's attitude to the farming communities, and here in the Vale I feel we may include the market gardening communities as well. Newcomers to the rural life and the conservationists had sometimes given the farming communities a hard time and the church

joined in, but now it was vital that the rural church which owed so much to generations of farming families should learn how to stand understandingly beside them. When God took human form, the Archbishop said, he came to a village, and from Jesus' parables you could see how much he was a villager born and bred, and this should send signals to our urban society that we need to relearn the spiritual values of rural life lest we lose touch with our faith. He said he was personally heartened by the decision to set up the Commission on rural areas and it had his full support.

It is hoped that much will be learnt about the future needs of the rural church and the directions in which it should move. First, the need for right structures and a right framework, both in terms of belief in God and Jesus Christ, and in the spiritual and moral values which flow from such belief. We need the right resources for growth. Secondly, in our understanding of the true nature and needs of the rural church and ministries. The rural ministries are no longer seen as some kind of sleepy self-sufficient, some might even say self indulgent adjunct to the urban and suburban church, but rather as ministries with complex and very demanding commitments of their own. Commitments which need to be recognised and met if the harvest is to be gathered in. Thirdly the realisation, that not even the Church can save itself. It is the Lord's work, and the Lord's harvest to which we are called. It is the Lord's vineyard, and it is only in the Lord, in Christ, the Church will find the right inspiration, guidance and direction in which to work.

Just as Jesus sent out first the twelve, then the seventy to every place where he himself was to come, so today he sends out his Church. It is a harvest which is still plentiful and will ever remain so. It is a harvest still waiting to be gathered in. "Pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into the harvest".
