

THE VICAR'S LETTER

July 1988

My dear Friends,

June 2nd marked the feast of Corpus Christi, the Body of Christ. It is the feast which celebrates the gift of the Eucharist, the Holy Communion, and is observed on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday. The natural day would seem to be Maundy Thursday, the night of the Last Supper when the Eucharist was first instituted by Jesus, but the memory of the Passion on that day made a separate day for the celebration of Corpus Christi desirable, and so the Thursday after Trinity Sunday was chosen as the first free Thursday after Eastertide. Whilst the feast of Corpus Christi is celebrated by certain parts of the church in this country, on the continent of Europe, especially in countries where the church is principally Roman Catholic, the feast has a far greater significance. Invariably it is a public holiday, the churches are full, and often processions take place through the streets. The sacraments are seen as the real presence of the Body of Christ in the midst of his church and people. and are venerated and revered as such. But whilst the sacraments and the eucharist represent the Body of Christ in this way, they have a wider and more universal meaning also. First in the Eucharist. The Body of Christ is represented by the whole of the Eucharist and not by just one isolated part of it. All who share, all who participate in the Eucharist, the communicants as well as the celebrant, are a part of the Body of Christ represented by the sacraments themselves. Secondly, the Body of Christ is represented by those in need. Christ is not only present in the sacraments, precious and unique though these are, but he is also present in those in any kind of need. They too represent the Body of Christ. We recall again the words of the righteous in Matthew's Gospel. "Lord when did we see thee hungry and feed thee, or thirsty and give thee drink? And when did we see thee a stranger and welcome thee, or

naked and clothe thee? And when did we see thee in prison and visit thee? And the King will answer them, "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my bretheran, you did it to me". We cannot venerate and adore the sacraments and celebrate the Eucharist and close our hearts and minds to our brothers and sisters in need. Our love must embrace them all, as Christ's love embraces us. The sacraments and the Eucharist are where we meet and revere the Body of Christ in the midst of the Eucharist and his church. Our brother and sister in need is where our love of the Body of Christ finds its real and practical expression.

Badsey Churchyard - Help still needed

Assistance is still needed in the upkeep of the churchyard, particularly with the cutting of grass on untended graves and general tidying up and burning of dead wood and flowers, and wreaths on the tip, as well as the disposal of other rubbish. MOTHERS UNIONS

On 24th May, Mrs. Olive Dukes came to speak to us. She began by reading the Mothers Union Aims and Objects with particular emphasis on the latter two: - 4. To promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children and 5. To help those whose family life has met with adversity. She then spoke of various activities from her own area and parish with regard to the support of younger women and of various group activities. The provision of homes for the elderly and for single parents, 'follow on flats' for the young homeless, refuge for battered wives and help for asian girls who had left home to

avoid arranged marriages. Also of probation schemes for learning skills and literacy. She touched on her work as a magistrate. Mrs Dukes gave

a good thought provoking talk.

Mrs Daphne Jones of Action Research for the Crippled Child was our speaker on 14th June. Action Research supports medical research leading to the prevention and alleviation of disability - from conception to old age. Because all administration costs are met from interest on funds already committed it is guaranteed every penny contributed goes into medical research. Currently about 150 grants are supported representing a total contribution of approxiamtely £6 million to medical research. Mrs Jones explained how the charity had started and its first success in supporting research into the polio vaccine. Later the ultra sound scan and German measles vaccine. Its continued grants for research into bone implants, cot deaths, spinal disorders and many many more mental and physical illnesses, and the colour slides she showed of the transformation in some patients' lives, left us in no doubt as to the invaluable work of Action Research. This was a most interesting and informative talk and made this charity one which we felt we should all support in the future.
