#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

October 1988

My dear Friends,

The 24th Olympic Games at present being held in Korea have been described as the greatest games ever. 9000 athletes from 161 nations representing 23 sports are in Seoul to take part in 237 different events. No expense has been spared to create the world's finest £57 million Olympic Stadium, Cycle arena, Swimming pool, Three Day Event Course and Gymnasium, all of which have brought enormous prestige to South Korea and its capital Seoul. It is entirely fitting that such should be the setting for one of the modern world's major sporting occasions.

But behind this showpiece, Korea is not a happy country. The separation between north and south, made worse by the Korean War of 1950-53, has been disastrous for many families. Today it is estimated that 10 million people are isolated from their relatives in much the same way as between East and West Germany. Sadly, contact between the north and south is practically non-existent. In the north there are possibly 10,000 Christians, and in the south, perhaps one third of the population is Christian. For any Christian to speak out for reunification is to risk arrest or even worse.

In Seoul, in 1987, demolition of certain properties took place under the name of 'redevelopment' aimed at 'beautifying' 230 acres of Greater Seoul by 1998, and many families were rendered homeless when the new apartments erected in their place were priced far beyond their means. Some of these families bought a small plot of land elsewhere in the city to build new homes, after living in tents in the grounds of Myondong Cathedral in Seoul. Only two days before they were due to move in, these homes were also demolished. When church representatives inquired why demolition had happened they were told the Sacred Olympic Flame would pass by the land on its way to the Olympic Stadium.

Like many countries in the world, Korea has its problems, some of them very serious. The magnificent stadiums and facilities for the Olympic Games which are such a tribute to South Korea's incredible economic development in recent years have only been achieved at a price. Free trade unions are illegal, and by western standards, working conditions, wages and work safety are very poor. This perhaps helps us to understand some of the tensions in Korean society today that lie behind the riots sometimes seen on our television screens.

Once again we hear how Christians and the Christian Church is being called upon to bear its witness in difficult and sometimes dangerous circumstances. As fellow Christians, we can remember our brothers and sisters in Christ in Korea in our prayers, and hold them in our hearts.
