

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

December 1988

My dear Friends,

Once again, on Christmas Day, Christian people throughout the world will celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. The one who came from God to light our way to God. The one who came to be the Light of the World. The Gospel tradition tells us that Jesus was born of lowly parents in the stable in Bethlehem and laid in a manger because there was no place for them in the inn. A scene which will be depicted on countless thousands of Christmas Cards and in many other ways this Christmas season.

This happened almost 2000 years ago. We might ask ourselves if Jesus were to be born today, in this day and age where would it be. Would it still be in Bethlehem of Judea among his own people in what has become a part of the occupied West Bank area of the old country of Palestine, an area of occupation by Israel of her Palestinian neighbours? Or somewhere very different yet in other ways similar. In one of the Urban Priority areas of this country, amidst much squalor and deprivation. Or perhaps in a Black African Township where people suffer much because of their culture, race and colour. Or in one of the world's many refugee camps, in Ethiopia, the Sudan or Kampuchea. Or in the squalid slums to be found in parts of Central and Southern America. Is this where we would have to journey with the shepherds and the wise men if we were to visit the infant Jesus and the Holy Family this Christmastime? Even in our churches, and certainly outside them it is very easy to clothe the Christmas Story with the beauty and loveliness, joy and merrymaking of Christmas whilst losing sight of the harsher realities which lie just below the surface. It is very easy to cloak our celebration of Christmas with sentimentality and pleasure whilst losing sight of its true message and meaning.

The word 'hypocrite' comes from a Greek word meaning simply 'a mask' one who wears a mask. In ancient times, Greek actors wore a mask to depict the person or character being portrayed. Many of us have seen the television commercial in which a series of models walk towards the camera holding a mask of a famous person in front of their face. For a moment they appear to be that person until we realise it is only a mask. One model actually carries two masks and removes the first only to reveal the second.

Are we in danger of becoming hypocrites at Christmastime? Someone who wears a mask. Someone who appears to be celebrating the birth of Jesus yet who in their heart remains someone else? A person for whom the needs of the poor the lowly and the oppressed are not things about which they wish to be reminded lest they should spoil their merrymaking and enjoyment.

Jesus still comes at Christmas. He comes to us wherever we are and whoever we are. He comes as the infant babe born in the humility of the stable in Bethlehem. He comes as our Lord and Master, whose words point the way to the reality of Christmas and the true meaning of love. The one who says, "Forasmuch as you do it (or do not do it) to the least of these my little ones, you do it (or do not do it) unto Me" and who warns us against the dangers of self-deception when he says, "Not everyone who says to me 'Lord, Lord' shall enter the kingdom of heaven but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven."

Christ came to fill our hearts with the joy and the glory of His Love. Let his love shine ever more brightly and effectively in our hearts this coming Christmastide. That in our giving, our sharing, our caring and our loving, we may know his presence with us always.

Report of Wickhamford P.C.C. meeting - November 16th

A major review of the values placed on the Church and its contents for insurance purposes, has been carried out. These total over £500,000 for which a premium of £539 will give us full cover. This compares with our present premium of £370 for a total value of about £300,000. In view of the increase in building repair costs, it was thought that the premium was not unreasonable and that we should accept the quotation.

It was announced that Miss Evelyn Cox would be playing the organ for us on Sunday November 27th for the last time. The occasion will be marked by a small presentation for her faithful service over several years.

The sale of Christmas Cards by Miss Holland had raised £75 which was

The sale of Christmas Cards by Miss Holland had raised £75 which was very much appreciated. A drawing of the Madonna and Child made by Miss Anna Hulbert in the form of a Christmas card, was presented to the committee. She had previously been responsible for the restoration of the Coat of Arms.

Our Quota for this year will be just under £2000 which will include a contribution of £123 towards the Badsey allocation as agreed previously. The target of £200,000 for the Diocese towards the Church Urban fund is hoped to be met early next year. Our contribution will be £463 out of our funds rather than making another appeal to parishioners.

The MEB has carried out a full survey of the electrical wiring in the Church and regretably a complete replacement will be necessary as the majority is lead covered. Estimates are to be obtained and the work put in hand as soon as possible.

A small increase in the cost of the magazine is proposed to allow for the

inclusion of more pages on a regular basis.

Mr G. Poulter reported on the visit of the Archdeacon to the Pastoral Committee, and outlined the difficulties that Bengeworth and Hampton were facing coping with the tremendous increase in their populations due to new development. Despite this the number of clergy will have to be reduced in the deanery by one.

WICKHAMFORD GARDENING CLUB

The Gardening Club's monthly meeting was held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 3rd November. Members and friends were soon assured of the current popularity of both ferns and ivies, during a talk by Ursula Key-Davis of Fibrex Nurseries Ltd., Pebworth. Ferns were apparently great favourites in Victorian times, when people simply collected them from the wild. Nowadays, the same varieties are propagated and nurtured by specialist nurseries.

Ivies (l.Hedera) deserve their high reputation as decorative plants. They make excellent climbers, and are also useful in hanging baskets, or as ground cover between larger plants. The talk was illustrated by a varied selection of both ferns and ivies.

The competition for a vase of dried flowers was won by Mr Tayler, 2nd Mrs Stratton, 3rd Mrs Stone.
