

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#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

November 1989

My dear Friends,

Worcester Cathedral Appeal

The Appeal for Worcester Cathedral was splendidly launched at a public service in the Cathedral on October 16th 1988, just over a year ago. The original target was £4 million. The Appeal was commended by the Bishop and Diocesan Synod to every parish and it was hoped every parish would do what they could do to help. No targets were set, each parish being left to decide on its own. With having reached and exceeded the prior commitment of the Church Urban Fund Appeal both parishes are now able to give their full attention to the Appeal for the Cathedral. Already the Appeal has raised £2.7 million and it is hoped the remaining £1.3 million will soon be achieved. Wickhamford began with a Cathedral Alleluia Beetle Drive and Badsey and Aldington have begun to organise special fund raising events for the same purpose. Several donations have been received. Once again, there are various ways in which can help. First by making an individual covenant. This has tax advantages and ensures a regular flow of money over a minimum period of four years. Covenant Forms are in each church and when completed may be sent direct to the Cathedral Appeal Office in Worcester. Secondly, by making a donation. This is the simplest and most direct way. Such donation may be large or small, and can be given to the Treasurer of either parish or to the Vicarage. Parishes have been asked to retain

such donations and bring them to special Gift services in the Cathedral to be held at different times throughout the year. One such service is to be held on Saturday, 2nd December from 4 pm to 5.15 pm. It is planned to take all monies collected within the benefice by this date to this service, when the Bishop will be present to receive them. Every parish is invited to bring as large a group as possible to join in the act of celebration and dedication. Those from within the benefice who would like to attend this service are asked to let me know as soon as possible. Thirdly, within the benefice people can support the various fund raising functions held or better still organise their own. The Dean has said that it is his deepest wish that the Appeal will not just raise the money so urgently needed, but will enable every parish to claim the Cathedral as its own. It belongs to us all.

# 'Go Tell' Sunday

Sunday November 19th is to be 'Go Tell' Sunday in the Diocese because our Lord said to Mary Magdalene "Go to my bretheren and tell them . . . . " This was her commission and that of every woman to proclaim the Good News. At Badsey, on this Sunday, women of the church will assist at both services and Mrs Anne Rolt a Reader, will preach at the Sung Eucharist in the morning, and Mrs Daphne Bell at Evensong. It is hoped our regular congregations will support both services at Badsey on this special Sunday. Further details will be given out nearer the time.

When I was young I wanted everything and all at once until our old Scottish minister explained things like this. One night he dreamed that he saw a new shop in the High Street. He went in and saw an angel behind the counter. Nervously he asked what the shop sold. "Everything your heart desires" the angel said. "Then I want peace on earth" cried the minister. "An end to sorrow, famine, and disease" "Just a moment" smiled the angel, "You haven't quite understood. We don't sell fruit here, only seeds"

## WICKHAMFORD IN 1852

The vicar of Badsey and Wickhamford from 1808 to 1852 was the Rev Charles Phillott, a non-resident, who employed a succession of assistant curates to care for the two parishes. The last of these was the Rev Edmund Boggis and the following extract from "The Rambler in Worcestershire", by John Noake, describes the scene in Wickhamford Church on the occasion of his farewell appearance there, probably on 13th June 1852. Noake wrote as follows:

"When I entered the Church, which was nearly half an hour

before the service commenced, the seats were quite full, except some monstrous large pews on the south side, the only occupant of which scowled on me so when I looked round for sitting room that I was fain to retire, and at last found a resting-place in the laps of two labourers, sitting on a plain bench behind a partition six feet high, forming the boundary of the aforesaid pews, which most effectually shut out from us the view of the rest of the Church. More comers continued to pour in, till the pews were also crowded, and in a place less sacred it would have afforded some amusement to note how delighted the rustics were who, by coming early, and being secure in the enjoyment of their own seats, watched the disappointed movements of those who came late and looked round imploringly for an inch of room. Behind us was a ladder. reaching up into the tower, and a number of boys took up their positions on the rounds, till the sermon putting them to sleep, they would probably most of them have broken their necks had it not been for the vigilance of the clerk, who kept himself awake by every now and then advancing to the west end and brandishing his cane towards the sleeping beauties of the ladder".
