

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends

At a recent PCC evening held at Holland House for Badsey PCC we watched a service of Songs of Praise made for Remembrance Sunday some two to three years ago. It was a Jewish Songs of Praise and in it several of those taking part spoke of their experiences in the camps in Europe during the Second World War. Among them was Rabbi Hugo Green, who as a young man had been in one of those dreadful camps. He was asked about his faith in such terrible conditions, to which he replied that although he felt totally abandoned by man he did not feel abandoned by God he said. "The question was not, Where was God? but rather, Where was Man? Where was culture, where was literature, music, philosophy, yes and even theology? All this was betrayed and who betrayed it? It was human beings". Others spoke in the same way, and that they were able to appear on such a programme bore witness to the way their faith had survived and lived through such an ordeal.

As I write this letter the threat of war in the Gulf becomes more real. Even now we fervently pray that open conflict and all its attendant horrors may be averted. Recent acts of terrorism in Northern Ireland have become even more appalling than before. In the face of such trials we too might be tempted to ask the question, "Where is God in all this". The answer is still the same. The question is, not where is God, but where is Man?

At Christmas we celebrate the birth of Jesus. The Prince of

Peace. We sing the hymn, "O come, O come Emmanuel" The word "Emmanuel" means "God with us". In the Old Testament book of Isaiah and in the Gospel of St Matthew we read, "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and you shall call his name Emmanuel (which means God with us).

The message of Christmas is that in Jesus God is with us. God has not abandoned the world to its fate no matter what man may do. In Jesus, God brings the light of his love into the darkness of this world. He seeks to reconcile man to himself through his love revealed in Christ Jesus. God is with us always, in the midst of our joys and happiness and our sorrows and suffering. He rejoices with us. He weeps with us. This is the eternal message of Christmas. A message which brings hope and life to the world. In this we rejoice, both now and at every Christmastide.

May this be a truly joyous and happy Christmas for you all. Your sincere Friend and Vicar,

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD PCC MEETING NOVEMBER 14th

In the Treasurers report Mrs Collis confirmed that the final total of £3357.52 had been raised at the very successful Floral Festival in August, a great credit to all concerned. However, our quota to the diocese for 1991 would be over £2100, an increase of 9% on 1989. The Vicar explained the complicated way in which the quota was apportioned to the various Parishes. Although the average increase was 9%, some parishes were facing increases of 17½%. The Cream Teas although not quite as successful as last year, raised £1223.14 a very creditable amount. The proceeds of the sale of produce at the Harvest Supper were £19.15 together with £11.60 raised by the game of Cathedral Beetle will be sent to the Save Worcester Cathedral Appeal. This now stands at over £4.5m towards a target of £5m.

It was agreed to increase our donations to Charity in line with inflation.

Payment for the hire of the village hall in respect of Cream Teas and Floral Festival amounted to £162.

A long discussion took place as to how we might widen the appeal of church attendance. It was generally felt that we should allow time on at least one Sunday in the month for a brief but informal discussion following the service. The 2nd Sunday in December was chosen as an opportunity to try and develop the 'fellowship' aspect of going to Church. If this is successful, it would provide an opportunity for all ages to understand better our faith and each other.

An open debate on the Ordination of Women will be held at St Egwins Hall in Evesham on January 26th at 10.15am until 12.15pm.


WICKHAMFORD FRIENDSHIP CLUB.
