

THE VICAR'S LETTER

February 1991

My dear Friends,

As I write this letter the last few hours are passing away before the deadline for Sadam Hussein to withdraw from Kuwait. By the time the letter is published hostilities may have already broken out. Should there be war it is almost impossible to say how it will develop. It may be over in a few days, or even weeks. It may drag on for months, even for a year or more. The consequences may be minimal. They may be disastrous. We don't know. We can only hope and pray that any conflict will be over quickly with the least loss of life and casualties to either side.

I know of two service personnel from this benefice, at present stationed with our forces in the Gulf. Both are from Wickhamford. There may be others. If so, I would welcome the opportunity to remember them in the prayers of the church, together with their families, and to commend them to God's

protection and safekeeping.

The crisis in the Gulf has again raised the question of Christian pacifism. Is it right to engage in open conflict against those who have become our enemies? Many hold deep and sincere views that we should not. But Christian pacifism takes no account of the struggle between good and evil, right and wrong which is constantly being waged in this world and is an inescapable part of life itself. Nor does it take account of a government's responsibility for the security and defence of its

people. Some of those advocating a pacifist approach today, were pacifists in the Second World War also. They are still alive because others made the supreme sacrifice on their behalf. This reminds us that we are Christians and members of Christ's church because he made the supreme sacrifice for our sakes upon Calvary's Cross. Had he not done so, had Christ avoided God's will for him or shirked it, we would have no Christian faith and there would be no Christian church. We would know nothing of the Resurrection. Jesus said, "Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends". In our prayers we remember those who may be called upon to follow most closely in the footsteps of our Lord at this time.

Elsewhere in this Review are details of the four Lenten services to be held in our two churches. If the war should be prolonged it is intended to pray especially for those involved as we meditate again upon the meaning of the Cross and prepare ourselves for the coming of Holy Week and Easter Day. It is hoped many will feel able to set aside at least a short time during these coming weeks to pray that the conflict, if it comes, will lead to a just, secure and lasting peace in the Gulf and throughout the Middle East.

LENT - 1991

A service of Holy Communion using the 1662 form of service and including a short reading will be held on four Thursday evenings during Lent. The first and third services on Thursday 21st February and the 14th March will be in Badsey Church at 8 pm, and the second and last services on 28th February and the 21st March will be in Wickhamford Church at the same time.

Lent is a time when we prepare ourselves especially for the events of Good Friday and Easter Day and focus our thoughts upon the Cross and the Resurrection and its meaning for us today. The 1662 form of Holy Communion service, now seldom used in either church, is very much centred upon the Cross and the sacrifice of Christ, more so perhaps than the modern forms of the Eucharist emphasising as they do the Resurrection of Christ. It is hoped those sharing in these services will find them a rewarding form of Lenten devotion, in preparation for the coming of Holy Week and Easter.
