

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

April 1991

My dear Friends,

All of us will have been heartened and tremendously thankful for the cease fire in the Gulf conflict. Whatever one may think about military action in such circumstances one cannot deny that for the Allied Forces the defeat of the forces of Saddam Hussein was an amazing achievement. Not only in the warfare itself which lasted for a comparatively short time, nor in the very high standards of professional competence of those engaged in it, but in the rapid deployment and build up of the Allied Forces beforehand from virtually nothing other than a vast expanse of empty desert. This, together with the political will and almost unanimous support of the Allied nations, was something quite unsurpassed in the history of modern warfare.

But from the outset of hostilities the final outcome, the final success or failure of this undertaking depended upon the qualities of those servicemen and women called upon to engage the enemy, whether in the front line or behind it, and in this the Allied Forces were not found wanting. Such qualities however are not achieved overnight. They cannot just be switched on when the need arises and then switched off again once the danger is past. It is said that a soldier's (or airman's or sailor's) task in peace is to train for war, but it is only when and if war comes that the effectiveness and value of such training becomes obvious. If it has been thorough, if it has been conscientiously and strenuously undertaken, then whenever and wherever the call may come, the serviceman and

woman will be ready to meet it. If on the other hand such training has been lax or non existent, if there has been no preparation beforehand, then such inadequacies and failings will soon be exposed.

In earlier years the Christian life was often likened to that of a soldier with its conflict against the forces of evil and wrong. Those destructive forces inherent in this world and this life. Forces which seem to be continually at work to undermine our faith and fortitude, often insiduously, but sometimes in what can only be described as open warfare. Whilst some may deplore such military comparisons, it cannot be denied that this is a warfare, a struggle in which we are all engaged, in which we are all involved. The struggle against temptation. The struggle against giving in to what we know is not right and not good. A struggle of which St Paul was well aware when he wrote in his letter to the Ephesians of the need to put on the whole armour of God. He says, "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might. Put on the whole armour of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all to stand" He goes on "Stand therefore having girded your loins with truth, having put on the breastplate of righteousness, having shod your feet with the equipment of the gospel of peace, above all taking the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." All examples of a Roman soldier's equipment when going into battle.

St Paul was never one to mince his words. It is in such vivid pictures we still see our role as Christians in the warfare against the adverse forces and influences of the world. The enemies of jealousy, of greed, of pride, of hatred, of arrogance, rudeness, resentment, selfishness, covetousness and apathy. These are the enemies at the door. But we do not fight with guns and bullets. Nor do we seek to kill. Rather to save. We seek to overcome them in the power of love. In the power of God's grace, of prayer, the sacraments, the scriptures. With the fruits of the Spirit, patience, joy, peace, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, truthfulness, self control, compassion, lowliness, meekness, humility, forebearing one another and forgiving one another. Strange though it may seem, these are the weapons of Christian's armoury and their use often calls for a degree of sacrifice and suffering, courage and bravery, wisdom and understanding, fortitude and endurance as great as that experienced on any battlefield today. They are weapons that can

demand the highest standards of professional skills and integrity in which we need to be constantly trained and practiced. But the final victory is assured. We need have no fear. For with them our Lord himself overcame the forces of evil and emerged triumphant. The sign of the Cross is the sign of victory, and it is in this sign we rejoice and conquer.

The Parish Church bells of St James' were rung on Wednesday evening, 13th February, to mark the ninety-eighth birthday of Badsey's oldest inhabitant, Miss Cecily Barnard, who lives in Vine Cottage. Unfortunately, Miss Barnard was in hospital recovering from an accident and unable to hear the bells at the time, but a recording has been made, and will be played to her when she returns home. During ringing, a telephone call to Wroughton, near Swindon, enabled her sister, Mrs Evelyn McKennan-Jones, to hear the bells, which were also rung as a compliment to other village nonagenarians, including Mrs E Cleaver (at Woodlands Nursing Home), Mrs Crisp, Mrs Hartwell, Mr F Hemming, Mr F Jelfs, the late Mrs E Bunce and Mrs N Flecknell. The Quarter-peal, 1260 changes of Grandsire Triples, was rung by Treble - A J Brazier, 2 - R W Kyte, 3 - M C Newbury, 4 - R C Hall, 5 - G D Payne, 6 - J H Smart, 7 - D G Hammond, and Tenor - C E Evans. The conductor was Mr J H Smart.

A donation of £5 towards St James' Bell Maintenance Fund from Miss G Barnard, in respect of the Quarter Peal, is gratefully acknowledged. The Parish Church bells were probably the first to respond to the call of Lt.Gen.Sir Peter de la Billiere, Commander-in-Chief of British Forces in the Middle East, on 28th February for people at home "to get out there and ring your church bells" and so mark the successful conclusion of Operation Desert Storm.

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD ANNUAL VESTRY & P.C.C. MEETING MARCH 13th

The church wardens were thanked for their faithful service during the past year. Before being re-elected, they both expressed a wish that although very willing to continue to serve for a further year, a change of Wardens from time to time should be encouraged. However, the vicar expressed the view that in the absence of further nominations their experience was a great asset and appreciated that they did not want to be re-elected automatically.

Mrs Baker reported that there had been a reduction of 69 to 65 members on the Electoral roll during the past year, 18 of which were non resident.

The accounts were presented by Mr Wadams who commended Mrs Collis, in her first year as treasurer, for the way that she managed the finances. Once again, our dependence on special efforts such as Cream Teas and the Flower Festival were vital to balancing our expenditure on Church maintenance, Quota and a modest level of donations to Charities. The future organisation of Cream Teas will be discussed at a special meeting as more voluntary help is urgently needed.

In the Vicar's 11th annual report he thanked everyone who had contributed towards maintaining the Church despite a slight decline in service attendance. The Confirmation of 11 candidates by the Bishop of Dudley had been a major event followed by the

Flower Festival in August. The closure of the Sunday School due to lack of numbers was disappointing but he thanked Mrs Anne Poulter and Mrs Carole Collis for their service over the years. Mr Gerard Poulter, in the fabric report, proposed that the time had come to redecorate the church now that the rewiring had been completed. Otherwise the general condition of the church remained good, including the Church yard thanks to regular mowing and tidying by Mr Robin Cox.

Mrs Anne Poulter reported that the children who were confirmed were now helping with Eucharist and 4th Sunday Services. She regretted that the Sunday School had now closed due to lack of numbers and other commitments of the Leaders, but she had enjoyed working with the children and hoped that they had gained from their attendance.

7 members were nominated for the new PCC and it was hoped to encourage some younger members to join.

Mrs Baker, and in his absence Mr Tuckwell, were thanked for their loyal support of the PCC following their wish not to be re-elected.

The new PCC members are Mrs T Dunkerley, Secretary, Mrs C Collis, Treasurer, Miss W Holland, Mrs A Launchbury, Mrs A Poulter, Mrs P Clinton, Dr. Wm. Astley, Mr K Maden.
