

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

May 1991

My dear Friends,

On a television programme, "After Dark" broadcast late on Easter Day, a number of people discussed the resurrection of Jesus. One of them, a woman, was a Roman Catholic and her publicly confessed faith and belief in the resurrection of Jesus was obvious and apparent, as well as being most inspiring and convincing. Another person taking part was one of the scientists who had proved the Turin Shroud to be a forgery, and it seemed as though his attitude to the resurrection of Jesus was very similar. Another of the speakers had come to a deep faith through believing in the authenticity of the Shroud, but, having come to such a faith, was now no longer concerned that the Shroud was not what it had seemed to be originally. Now his faith was firmly established in its own right. Another speaker saw both the Cross and the Resurrection in spiritual terms and likened the Cross to man's crucifying of the environment. An Anglican chaplain from one of the Oxford Colleges sought to hold the middle ground between these diverse views, between the resurrection as a reality and its spiritual interpretation, whilst finally, for the leader of the British Secular Society, Jesus Christ was no more real than Father Christmas. As the discussion and debate developed the interesting contrasts between the beliefs and non beliefs of those taking part became more marked and more apparent. One was reminded of Jesus' own words to his first disciples, "Who do men say that I am?" and "Who do you say that I am?" To which Simon Peter replied, "Thou

art Christ, Son of the Living God".

In a more recent interview on television, George Carey, the new Archbishop of Canterbury, reaffirmed his personal belief in the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. He said, in as many words, who are we to place any limitation upon what God can or cannot do beyond our own very limited and finite understanding and comprehension. To do so, is in effect to make ourselves equal with God. Again we recall words of scripture, this time from the Acts of the Apostles, when St Paul, appearing before King Agrippa says, "Why is it thought incredible, by any of you that God raises the dead?"

If therefore God raised Jesus from the dead, if it was, in fact, none other than the power of God that restored Jesus to life again, what are the implications of such an amazing and incredible happening for us? What difference does it make, or should it make, in the relationship between God and ourselves? What kind of God are we dealing with? Do we not feel a sense of awe, of mystery, of wonder, of reverence, even fear? Once more we turn to the scriptures and possibly the earliest account of the resurrection of Jesus as recorded by St Mark in his gospel. Here we read of how on the first Easter Day, the women who discovered the empty tomb, fled, for trembling and astonishment had come upon them, and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

But where, might we ask, do we find this same sense of awe, of mystery, of wonder, of reverence, even of fear in peoples' attitudes towards God and the things of God today? His name is often profaned both in the media and in public. His will is flouted or ignored, and his two most precious gifts of life and love are desecrated and despoiled. As St Paul says, quoting from the Psalms "There is no fear of God before their eyes", although elsewhere the Psalmist sees it more positively when he says, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; a good understanding have all those who practice it".

Our God is a God of Love. A God of infinite mercy and forgiveness. A God whose will it is that we should respond to him in love and faith and trust, not fear, for perfect love casts out fear. Whose will it is we should be saved from the power of sin and not overcome by it. For it is in nthe power of God, the power that raised Jesus from the dead, that we are saved. Saved from the death of sin and raised to the life of righteousness, and share with him, in the life of our Risen and Ascended Lord.

These were followed by St Mary and St Milburgh, Offenham. In the evening, bells from Evesham Bell Tower, St Michael, Buckland, St Egwin, Norton, St Matthew, Salford Priors, and St Nicholas, Middle Littleton, also pealed out. No doubt other bells throughout the country will have been rung, but I thought you and your troops would like to learn our delight at the 'great victory', and relief that hostilities ended so speedily.

Congratulations to the British and Allied Forces are tinged with sorrow at the loss of life and injuries sustained during the conflict, but I can only repeat comments already made by saying "it had to be done".

I hope you will soon be able to look forward to, and enjoy, your delayed retirement.
