

#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

On the Eighth Sunday before Christmas, the theme of the readings is "The Fall". We recall the ancient story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden. They are tempted by the Serpent to eat of the Tree of the knowledge of good and evil. A temptation to which they succumb in the belief that they will become as gods. For to know the good and evil is to know everything, and to know everything is to become as God and be immortal. But, in the story, the opposite happens. Adam and Eve are cast out of the Garden and become mortals. They forfeit the gift of eternal life and know that one day they will die.

In the Bible, the purpose of this ancient story from the book of Genesis, is to illustrate the natural temptation of man, the temptation to reject his obedient dependence upon God. The temptation to become independent of God and to live his life without God. But to do this is to die. In the story of Cain and Abel which follows we see how in Cain's killing of his brother Abel, this same rebelliousness against God and man's disobedience leads to fratricide, the killing of one's brother, of which there is ample evidence in the world of today whether in Northern Ireland, Yugoslavia or the Middle East. The lesson within these stories, is that man will always be rebellious, with this tendency within him to turn away from God. But with his gift of free will, he still has the choice of two ways. To live his life with God, and thereby to find life or to live his life without God and thereby lose it.

Thus the story of Man's redemption unfolds. God's plan to win man back to himself. To save man from the consequences of his sin. Man of himself, cannot do this. Only God can do it for him. The story begins with the call of Abraham, and God's choice of a people, a nation, who by their own obedience, their own way of life with God will turn man back again to God. It reaches its culmination in the coming of God himself in human form. The people is Israel. The person in whom God comes is Jesus. Jesus, who lived a life of perfect obedient dependence upon God, at one with God, even though it led to the Cross. The one who restored the gift of eternal life to Man, through his own dying and resurrection from the dead.

This obedient dependence upon God, perfectly revealed in Jesus, was foreshadowed in Mary his mother, who when told by the Angel Gabriel that the child to be born of her would be called holy, the Son of God, responded with the words, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord, be it unto me according to

your will"

We too have the same choice, the same opportunity today. To live our lives with God, with Jesus. The message of Christmas is, that Christ came to live a life of perfect trustful obedience and dependence upon God and thereby win for all who believe on his name the gift of eternal life with God, both now and in the life to come. This is the good news of the Christian Gospel enshrined in the readings of every Christmas Carol Service. This is the good news of Christmas in which we rejoice at this festive season.
