

THE VICAR'S LETTER

January 1992

My dear Friends,

This time last year we stood on the threshold of 1991. The outlook was not good. The threat of war in the Gulf was ominously close. Serious disruption of the world's oil supplies was a very real possibility, with all the attendant political, economic and social consequences that would have undoubtedly ensued. The reception of casualties was being prepared for on an unprecedented scale. The release of western hostages in the Middle East could not have seemed more remote, assuming that they were still alive. Prayers were being offered constantly in Christian churches throughout the world for the safety and well being of those most closely caught up in this frightening situation. No one could foresee what the outcome would be or what the future would bring. Yet now it seems it has all been forgotten. It seems to belong to another age.

Looking back at the beginning of another new year, the word which seems to sum up all that has taken place is the word, "deliverance". One of the great words and themes of the scriptures. Deliverance from the threat of a terrible and awful tragedy, even though there are those who would say this was only the beginning of a much longer drama. Secondly, the answer to prayer. As we look on all that happened including the release of the hostages, can we not say that our prayers were answered. Even if it was a qualified answer.

Today, we look out upon a world in which there is still much suffering and instability. Where the future for many is as precarious and uncertain as ever. A world in which there is a constant struggle against inequality and injustice. Yet a world in which there is still much hope and love. A world in which we are all becoming increasingly aware of the needs of others. Aware that if we would meet Jesus today, we must meet him not only in the sacraments, precious though they are, nor in the Word of God to be found in the scriptures, powerful though His Word may be, but also in the needs of others. Those who are hungry, the homeless, those who have lost hope, those who have never known what it means to be loved, or have lost the love they once had. This is where Jesus is to be found. For in everything we do for them, we do for Him.

In this we find our true joy and true reward and the

answer to our prayers.
