

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## THE VICAR'S LETTER

October 1992

My dear Friends

A few weeks ago I was reading about the life of the Church and other Christians in the world through the Church Missionary Society magazine "Yes", and the Bible Lands Society magazine "Star of the East" and I was very moved and humbled by the way others are bearing their Christian witness in situations and circumstances very different from our own. Bearing their witness amidst hardship, poverty, deprivation, danger, famine and starvation in situations that affect them just as much as those they are trying to help. Yet five things came through in all their different reports and letters. First, a deep and personal relationship with Jesus Christ as a real and living person. A relationship which sustains them in everything they do. A loving and devoted relationship that is the sole source of all their inspiration. Secondly, their faith and joy. Faith and joy in the face of adversity and the unknown. Not knowing what the next day might bring, if indeed it brings anything. Sometimes not even knowing if there will be a next day. Faith and joy that in the midst of such difficult and challenging situations the Lord is still at work and accomplishing much through their efforts. They could still see things happening and for

this they were so profoundly thankful and grateful Thirdly prayer, and how dependent they are on it. Prayer that is a deep communion with God through which they live their lives, day by day, week by week, month by month. Sometimes hour by hour. A communion with God and a fellowship with each other through which they are guided by God in faith and trust and hope. Fourthly, the work they are doing. Theirs is not just a faith and a religion of words and beliefs, it is a faith and a religion which finds very real and practical expression in the way they live their lives, whether it is teaching in an agricultural college in drought stricken Africa, running a medical unit or hospital in the Southern Sudan, caring for drug addicts in the cities of India and Pakistan, running rehabilitation centres in Bethlehem and Beirut, or coping with language difficulties in South America. Theirs is a very practical faith and a very real expression of their religion. lastly, the truly universal nature of Christ's church. These are not just a few isolated examples happening in one or two places and nowhere else. Rather they are patterns repeated over and over again throughout the world and the years. Some are known, thousands more are unknown, yet all are evidence of the presence of the Risen Christ in his world, loving and caring for his children.

Elsewhere in this issue of the Parish Review there is a short article on the reforming of the Overseas Committee and what it hopes to do. It is a very important part of our Mission and Outreach in the benefice. Not only for the way in which we can help and support others through our efforts and prayers, but also for the way in which they can

so inspire us.

## OVERSEAS COMMITTEE

The Overseas Committee has been re-formed after a short break and the members of the committee have decided to sponsor a student nurse in Nazareth through the Bible Lands Society with, we hope, the help of the kind people of Badsey. The Bible Lands Society is a non-denominational registered charity and has arranged sponsorship of student nurses since 1970 in co-operation with the Edinburgh Medical Mission who are responsible for the Hospital. The cost of training one Practical Nurse is £120 and the course lasts for 18 months. Some Practical Nurses have proved so capable that they have been offered the chance to upgrade their qualifications to Registered Nurse level at the cost of £120 a year for 2 years.

We propose to raise £240 over the next two years and any

support will be welcome. Our first pledge of help has come from the children via Mrs Yvonne Haines — the Sunday School will donate their Lent collections and Mrs Sue Cole will involve the Brownies.

It is important that we raise the first £120 quickly as the sponsorship cannot start until the first instalment has been paid.

## REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD PCC MEETING, 9 SEPTEMBER
