

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The Vicar's Letter

November 1992

My dear Friends,

Remembrance Sunday is when we remember again those who died in the two world wars, and in the many conflicts which have followed since. Those who laid down, who sacrificed their lives in the cause of peace and freedom. That others may live and enjoy freedom from want, freedom from fear, freedom of speech and freedom of worship, freedoms enshrined in the Charter of the United Nations Organisation.

But in the last few months we have sensed again some of the old tensions long since thought to have died and been extinguished for ever. There has been the unveiling of the statue to "Bomber Harris" in London that was the cause of controversy. Now this has been followed by celebrations at Peenemunde, in Germany, ostensibly to mark the beginning of the space age by the wartime V2 Rocket, manufactured and based there during the Second World War. October 23rd marked the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Alamein, but it is understood that the German representation on this occasion was less than hoped for. 1994 will mark the 50th anniversary of "D" Day in Europe and 1995 the 50th anniversary of the ending of the Second World War in Europe and against Japan in the Far East. Over the next few years therefore the number of such

anniversaries is likely to be more rather than less, with the consequent risk of tension and bad feeling on both sides.

This must not be allowed to happen and it will require great sensitivity and diplomacy by all concerned if it is to be avoided. We need to remember that what seems good to one person, can be a source of grave offence to someone else. Whilst it is right we should remember those who made the supreme sacrifice in the two World Wars and in the many conflicts since, we must also remember the reasons why their sacrifice was made, and be on our guard against the glorifying of such wars and conflicts just for their own sake. For in so doing we run the risk of undermining the peace and freedom for which we all yearn so desperately even today, and for which they died.

Sarajevo, now the capital of the beleagured Bosnia-Herzegovina and once part of Yugoslavia, was where the First World War effectively began in June 1914, with the assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the then Austro-Hungarian Empire. By way of total contrast, it was also where Jayne Torvill and Christopher Dean won their Olympic Gold Medals in 1984 with their unforgettable and breathtaking performance of "Bolero" which gained perfect marks from all the judges. Today that same city, has now been described by an eyewitness in an American transport plane corkscrewing its way down into Sarajevo airport with United Nations relief supplies, as a ghost city of burnt out red roofs and crumbling concrete - framed by darkening mountainsides and white hot Serbian artillery.

It is now almost 2000 years since the time of Jesus, and people have still not found peace, or if they have, they are in danger of losing it. But the struggle for peace and freedom must go on, unrelentingly and unswervingly through agencies such as the United Nations, through the councils of Europe itself, and through the ties and relationships so painstakingly and effectively built up between different peoples and nations during the past forty years. We must not give up and we must not lose hope. We must not lose the vision for which so many once gave their lives. Although it still seems that the struggle for peace and freedom is one which will always mean cost and sacrifice to those most closely caught up and involved in it.

The evening meeting on 22nd September began with Hymn 126, The King of Love my Shepherd is. After prayers, Mrs Seaman gave a short account of the Central Council meeting

in Birmingham on 9th September.

The Deanery Stall in Abbey Gates precinct raised £236.75 for MU Overseas work. Thanks are due to members for gifts and time spent selling, it was a pleasant and interesting event. After the business matters, our speaker was Mrs Brett Rewse, who told of a holiday she and her husband took in Rumania not long after the Revolution. They had hoped it would be cancelled, but it was not, so they decided to go, and her description of life there, and the hardships of the ordinary citizens was sobering and moving. They visited a childrens home and it was so upsetting that she had to go out. Rumanians asked them where they had come from and asked them to tell people at home of their plight. It was a very interesting talk, and she was warmly thanked. Our afternoon meeting on 13th October began with the Hymn King of Glory, King of Peace. After prayers a letter from Mrs Meikle of Pershore, was read. She is appealing for wool, buttons, needles, zips, material and sewing machines that are unwanted, for a Christians Community project in the poorest part of Addis Ababa in Ethiopia. It is a case of helping people to help themselves. If anyone has any of these things, would they bring them to me at 5 School

Lane, and Mrs Meikle will collect them. Members were thanked for all they did for our Harvest Celebrations, decorating the Church and distributing gifts on the Monday after the Harvest Festival. Business over, the speaker was our Vicar Rev. Peter Mitchell, whose subject was Water. He gave an interesting talk mentioning droughts here and elsewhere in the world, and how essential water is to everyone. He reminded us of the story of Hagar, who was cast out into the desert with Ishmael, and how she was led to water on two occasions by God. In the desert and dry countries small settlements grew up around springs and wells which had to be abandoned if the supply dried up. He spoke of the Woman of Samaria and of her conversation with Jesus, and how they were thinking on two levels, she of the actual water, and Jesus of the water of life, a spring which never dries up, and of which all may drink and be refreshed.

He was thanked by Mrs D Bell. Mrs C Davies then gave a short account of the Campden Deanery MU outing to Winchester and Old Arlesford. The weather was warm and sunny and the Cathedral is very beautiful and impressive. Mary Sumner and her husband are buried in the graveyard there. After lunch we went on to Old Arlesford and visited the huge vicarage where George Sumner was incumbent for some years. We sat in the Drawing room where the first MU meeting took place in 1876. We toured the house, had tea in the garden, and then attended Evensong in the little church. It was a lovely outing, and thanks are due to Ivy Leigh, once one of our members, who told us about it.

In a modest parish with a relatively small team of workers this is a wonderful effort, and all the more praiseworthy because it has been sustained over so many years. During discussion by the P.C.C. in 1991 it was decided that, in order to assist the Memorial Hall to become a viable enterprise, the Church should make an annual donation based on its use of the Hall, and would also pay the prevailing rate for the hours involved in providing 'Cream Teas'. This means that something like £180 will have to be paid for this season's use, but, in view of the vastly superior amenities now available at the Hall, this seems to us to be a very fair arrangement, and a very considerable sum still remains to assist with paying the Quota for 1992 of f2,343 and other church expenses.

So too is her love of dough cakes which she received as a reward for delivering bread and cakes with the baker to the out lying villages each Saturday.
