

THE VICAR'S LETTER

February 1993

Dear Friends,

January 25th concluded another Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The path towards christian unity is like a tide that seems to ebb and flow, sometimes moving forward towards a closer unity between the churches and some times seeming to recede from it. At the present time, the Anglican Communion and in particular the Church of England, is caught up in a struggle in trying to preserve its own unity. This following the recent decision of the General Synod to ordain women to the priesthood. As yet it is impossible to say what the final outcome may be but for the good of the church and its mission, one hopes and prays that the unity of the Church of England may yet be preserved.

Then too there have been the recent disclosures concerning the Royal Family and the effect these might have on the teachings of the church, as well as the constitution of the nation and the position of the monarch as defender of the faith and supreme governor of the Church of England. Again it is impossible to say what may be the final outcome, but like the ordination of women to the priesthood it is a matter likely to be with the church well into the 21st century.

But the questions such issues raise, are very similar. Namely, how much should the church remain faithful to and uphold the teachings and example of Christ and of God as revealed in the scriptures, and how much in its endeavours to be a church that seeks to get alongside people where they are, should it reflect the world in which they live and be something with which they can identify totally in all their needs? How does it distinguish between moving with the times and holding on to the things that are eternal? These questions are ones with which the church has wrestled since its earliest days, and the answer in one instance may not be the same as in another. It may well be right for the church to move with the times as far as the ordination of women to the priesthood is concerned but still wrong to undermine or compromise the teachings of its Lord in other areas. For instance, it would be quite wrong for the church to abandon the sacraments, the scriptures or the Lord's Prayer simply because there were people outside the church who had never heard of them or who had no respect or regard for them. In love and humility, in understanding and in wisdom, and above all under the guidance and direction of the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of all Truth, the church must always remain faithful to its Lord otherwise it risks losing its integrity and ceases to be an effective witness to the saving power of the Gospel.

But we need have no fear. The church has passed through turbulent and uncertain times before, as did its Lord and apostles such as Peter James and John and Paul, not least in its relationships with the state. No doubt it will do again. But it is the Lord's church and he will lead it and protect it in ways which seem best to him. Having brought it this far, he is unlikely to abandon it now. For we, like those before us and those who will come after us, have his promise and assurance that if we remain faithful to him, he will never leave us or forsake us. And therein lies our hope

and confidence for the future.

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD PCC MEETING ON JAN 13th
We will have Matins for the first time for a number of years at 10.30am on January 24th.

Following a visit to the Church by the Diocesan Advisory Committee, a letter has been received regarding acceptable forms of heating in a Grade I listed church. Quartz heating, underpew heating, a door screen or bare flame heat were unsuitable, but fan assisted stored heat would receive favourable consideration. Despite several meetings involving the MEB who promised help in providing additional heat, nothing had materialised. It was therefore decided to ask an independent heating advisor to visit the church and give us his recommendations.

Mr Poulter said that he was trying to maximise the present system at a reasonable cost - now about £25 per week. It has been decided to add colour to the Parish Review but not to alter the design.

Mrs Collis reported that the Christmas Collection for the Church of England Children's Society was £63.

The Quinquenial Architectural report has recommended that a lightening conductor should be fitted to the Church, a thorough investigation of all timber work be made and repair of the masonry where necessary. Apart from other

longer term inspections the general condition of the church was said to be very good. The usual round of meetings regarding specifications, quotes and approval from the Diocesan Advisory Committee will be necessary. The Flower Festival Committee will meet for the first time on January 21st.
