

THE VICAR'S LETTER

April 1993

My dear Friends,

Easter is a time of new life, new hope, and new creation. All around us we see the first signs of another summer. The hedgerows are turning to a lovely fresh green and the flowers growing in increasing profusion in the gardens. We are fortunate in this country that the natural order of creation coincides with the Church's celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead and the festival of Easter. In the time of Jesus in Israel, as today, these events coincided not with the beginning of spring, but with the harvest. The putting of the sickle into the ripe corn and the separation of the wheat from the tares. The ingathering of the barley harvest completed six weeks later at the Jewish Feast of Pentecost. Activities seen in religious terms not only as an offering of the first fruits of the harvest to God in thanksgiving and joy, but also in terms of judgment and the final fulfilment of all things. But where we live, this is a time of the year for preparing the ground and sowing the seed, in the hope and promise of a harvest which has yet to come. Just as it has already come in Israel.

These simple examples illustrate two truths, which I believe are very important and which we should never lose sight of even in the midst of all the clamour and aggro of this world when so much of man's vision is clouded and

turned in on himself.

First, the timelessness of God. That sense of the eternal which lies at the very heart of creation, and everything there is. The realisation that nothing lies beyond the bounds of God's love. Nothing is ever outside it. We have seen recently on our television screens the space scientists trying to rectify the faults on the Hubble Space Satellite. If they are successful, this satellite, with its telescope may unlock the origins of the universe and the mysteries of time itself, in as much as man will ever be able to know or comprehend them. Even we can experience this same sense of timeless eternity when we look out into space on a dark starlit night. We recall the well known hymn by Isaac Watts based on Psalm 90, with its verse, "A thousand ages in thy sight, are like an evening gone. Short as the watch that ends the night, before the rising sun."

This brings us to the second truth contained in our two illustrations of springtime and harvest. That whilst eternity may last for ever, in this world we do not. In all our lives there is a springtime and a harvest, and against the dimension of eternity, how short and precious such life is. Brief life is here our portion. Or in the more fatalistic words of the writer of Ecclesiastes, "For everything there is a season, and time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die" Words that know nothing of the

vision of the New Testament and of Easter.

It is the resurrection of Jesus from the dead which takes us beyond such a fatalistic outlook on life and leads us into an entirely new dimension. A dimension which, in Jesus, the sense of the eternal and life in this world become as one. We recall Jesus' own words from John's gospel. "I am the resurrection and the life; he who believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" The use of the words "I am" is one of the great descriptive sayings of Jesus which occurs several times in the gospel of John. And here, Jesus uses it not just. as an expression of his own personal identity, although it is, but in the sense of timeless eternity, the continuous and ever present, without beginning or end. These majestic words when spoken by Jesus identify him with none other than the splendour and majesty and the timeless nature of God himself. God our heavenly Father, the Father of all creation.

"Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever" Jesus, our Risen and Ascended Lord. This is the timeless message of the Resurrection the Church celebrates with such joy at Easter. A message the Church is called to proclaim to the world. That all, believing in him might indeed have life in his name, and share, with him, in the life that is eternal.

A very happy and joyous Easter to you all.

The office here also supplies news for the Worcester Evening News. They have a staff of 2 sub-editors, 5 reporters and 3 photographers, also people in each village who supply local news. The paper is only free where people can be found to deliver. He then went on to explain how the paper is compiled mainly by computer. Each reporters computer is linked to the main one, and the reports fed in. The computer then compiles the pages. He went on to say that 75% of the paper is advertisements and a full page advert costs around £1,500. He showed two videos on how in the past each page was compiled one at a time and how it is done on the computer now.

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD ANNUAL VESTRY AND PCC MEETING Held on 10th March 1993

There were no other nominations for Churchwardens at the Vestry meeting, so Mr Gerard Poulter and Mrs Thelma Dunkerley were re-elected for the coming year. Although happy to continue, they both expressed a wish that a deputy should be appointed, to at least be aware of what being a warden of the church entailed. The Vicar thanked them for their faithful service.

At the General meeting, it was with great regret that Miss W. Holland had sent a letter of resignation from the PCC. It was unanimously agreed that a letter should be sent, expressing sincere thanks for her many years of devoted service to the Church Council. Mrs P Baker reported that the Electoral Roll now stood at 67 resident and 17 non resident members.

The auditor, Mr M Wadams presented the accounts, which, thanks to the special fund raising events, showed that the church's expenses had been met. Mrs C Collis (Treasurer) pointed out that the quota had risen by 12.9% and it was predicted that this could be 25% in future — way beyond inflation. The cost of running the church amounted to £100 per week and money given in the form of covenants towards this, was worth an extra £500 in tax reclaimed.

In his report the Vicar thanked the dedicated band of church officers and helpers and referred to them as a "family". The change in church services reflected the overall age of the congregation and regretably there were less younger people attending church. A drop of 1% in the interest rate cost the Diocese £50,000 or the equivalent of three clergy. Mr G Poulter thanked the Vicar for his efforts on behalf of the "family".

A very detailed Architects report, had been received during the past year which set out recommendations for the future care of the church but in general the condition was good. Once again, Mr R Cox was commended for the care of

the Churchyard.

WICKHAMFORD GARDENING CLUB

Keen members and friends of the Club met for their monthly meeting in the Memorial Hall on Wednesday 3rd March, to listen intently to a very absorbing talk, accompanied by slides, on Daffodils, given by Mr Michael Jefferson-Brown, who is a very keen breeder in this field.

After a get-together over coffee and biscuits, members settled down to hear how the Daffodil/Narcissi had been bred from the wild Daffodil in the 1850's and is the easiest garden plant to grow. It comes in diverse sizes and stature and if planted 4" to 5" down, can be a delightful flower in

the garden in Spring. The colours range from white, yellow, lavender, pink and even green. It takes a lot of genetic engineering to get a new Daffodil and they vary considerably from large central trumpets down to very small cups, the latter being the Jonquils.

The old fashioned Daffodils are still very attractive, as are the doubles and not forgetting the Poet or Pheasant's Eye and the tiny Bulbocodium. After several questions had been answered, Mrs Ella Batchelor, Chairman, thanked the speaker for what had been a very pleasant evening.

The competition for Three cut Daffodil/Narcissi stems, was won by Mrs A Spiers with Mr D Hadley and Mrs D

Stacey second and third.

The next meeting will be the Annual Spring Show and will take place at the Hall on Wednesday 7th April, when it is hoped that there will be a good turnout, including newcomers, who will be most welcome.
