

THE VICAR'S LETTER

August 1993

My dear Friends,

In the Vale recently there has been a considerable outbreak of stealing and thefts, and several people in the benefice have been seriously affected by it. These have not been just isolated incidents, but rather evidence of determined and organised crime. Some have suggested that the police ought to bring back the village "bobby" and it is true that such a move would represent a more obvious presence of law and order in the area. But as we already know, we are not dealing with the kind of petty larceny with which the village policeman was familiar and could cope with quite adequately, but rather crime which requires far more sophisticated means of detection and prevention if the criminals are to be apprehended and crime prevented.

There is also another way too. To teach people to observe the Ten Commandments, and in this case the Eighth Commandment in particular, the commandment, "Thou shalt not steal". Commandments, which it has been said, Man has known to be necessary for a sound and healthy society since three thousand years before Christ. Commandments which recognise, that Man is not the sole arbiter of his own destiny, but rather lives under an authority greater than himself to which ultimately he is responsible.

For the Christian, the Ten Commandments are the commandments of God, which Man disregards to his cost. They are commandments shared with the Jewish faith, from whence they originate, but they are also commandments shared with other faiths as well. For our moral conduct, the way we behave, is one of the ways in which we live and express our faith. And our faith doesn't mean much without We all need something to believe in and something to live our lives by. What we believe is very important. It determines the way we behave, and the kind of people we become. And the kind of people we become determines the kind of society in which we live. If people believe it is wrong to steal they will live in a society where their goods and property are safe and secure. If they believe there is nothing wrong in stealing, then they will live in a society where no-one's property will be safe or secure.

But perhaps the root cause of the trouble is that man has ceased to believe in God, or at least a God who is active in the lives of people. Man may have rid himself of many of the old superstitions and fears associated with God, but in many instances he has got rid of God as well. He has in effect, thrown out the baby with the bathwater. For many people God is no longer a living reality or presence in their lives. And when people dismiss God from their lives, then the chances are that some, if not all, of his commandments will go with Him, together with the sense of ultimate

authority upon which they rest.

Again it has been said our moral, our spiritual and our material wellbeing are all bound up together. Weaken and undermine one and you weaken and undermine the others. Perhaps one of the more serious weaknesses of recent years is that people have been actively encouraged to become more rebellious and disobedient and to react against any kind of authority whether it be of the government, the police, teachers in the classroom, the church or even of God himself, in whatever way we may understand his ways with us. So, as a result and because of the economic straits many people now find themselves in, the society in which we live is itself becoming increasingly lawless and disobedient.

What we need, is not just more police around our towns and cities and villages, but rather a renewed belief in the Commandments of God. A realisation that in them we have a moral basis for our lives which has stood the test of

centuries. And secondly we need to repent. We need to turn back to God. We need to turn back to Jesus and rediscover in Him, the ultimate source of all goodness, power and love.

BADSEY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE JULY MEETING

A speaker from the Vale Wild Life Rescue drew members to the village hall for the July meeting.

Mrs Sparrow, the President, opened the meeting welcoming a visitor. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. In matters arising Mrs Sparrow said the trip to see 'Starlight Express' had been enjoyed by all who went. The Coffee Morning as part of a chain had raised £100 for the Cobalt Fund. The work on the Remembrance Garden had to be cancelled due to rain, but would now take place on July 26th.

Wickhamford W.I. invited members to join them for outings to 3 Choirs Vineyard and Portmerion. County H.Q. wanted contributions to their Commemorative Book and that next March would be New Members Month. Members were reminded of the Evesham Walk on 28th July organised by County. Mrs Yvonne Haynes outings Secretary hoped to organise a trip to Birmingham Botanical Gardens and the T.V. Garden and also to Ashorne Nickelodeon Museum near Warwick. Mrs Brenda Osbourne gave a humorous account of her visit to Denman College with the President and Mrs Davies. They had much enjoyed a Relaxation, Rambling and

Swimming Course, and recommended members to try it.

Mr Alan Brockbank of the Vale Wild Life Rescue then gave a wonderful talk on the Centre and its work. With the help of slides he told us the history and sometimes humorous side of the animals and birds in their care. are available 24 hours a day to give assistance to injured animals and birds and to help the R.S.P.C.A. with rehabilitating them on recovery. They handle approximately 2,000 patients a year with a success rate of 88%. They assist the local veterinary surgeons in helping the recovery of wild life after operations. No injured animal is refused help. Work starts at 5 am on feeding everyone and at least 400 tins of cat and dog food are used each week. Their friendly otter is now a T.V. star. Later this year they hope to have a lake and a bat roost ready with an Education Centre for schools. Their latest addition were two lambs called Mint and Sauce. Members much appreciated his talk.

A complicated operation was needed, so the hospital contacted a Jewish surgeon and together with their own Arab anaesthetist and a Swiss Paediatrician and the Hospital's own backup staff the operation was carried out. With combined skill the baby's life was saved, milk is going the right way and she is thriving'.
