

### THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends

# Romance and Reality

Some of you may have been following the correspondence in recent issues of the Evesham Journal on Simon de Montfort who died in the Battle of Evesham in 1265. In his conflict with King Henry III, Simon de Montfort has been hailed as the "father of democracy" and the beginnings of the parliamentary system of councils and bodies in these islands, albeit in a very embryonic form are attributed to him. His dying in the Battle of Evesham is seen almost as something akin to martyrdom, and there are those in Evesham who feel he should be commemorated even more so than at present. But there are others who hold a different view. For them this is an "idealised" picture of Simon de Montfort far removed from the truth as it was at the time. For them the rebellion of Simon de Montfort and his fellow barons represented the interests only of themselves against the constant and extravagant demands of a weak and ineffective King much as the earlier barons had forced the "Magna Carta" on Henry's father, King John, a far more cruel, selfish and ruthless adversary. It had nothing whatsoever to do with the interests of the common people. Whilst Simon de Montfort and his fellow barons may have wanted to parley with the King, (the word "parliament"

comes from the French word "parler" meaning "to talk) and forced him to do so, those same barons would have been horrified at the thought of having to parley with their own serfs, peasants or soldiers, and any attempt to make them do so would have been swiftly and summarily dealt with.

Historians who hold this view say that Simon de Montfort ended his life, not only as rebel, but having become a tyrant and a despot as well, hated by his enemies and deserted by all but a handful of his former supporters and fellow barons. At the Battle of Evesham he received nothing more than his just desserts. He was no democrat and he was no martyr, even though he was buried in Evesham Abbey. Prince Edward who defeated Simon de Montfort and who later became Edward I, one of the greatest of the Plantagenet kings, was the real hero of the hour.

This debate about Simon de Montfort shows how, historically speaking, romance can become separated from reality and how difficult it can be to distinguish between the two. We see this with individual people such as Simon de Montfort who some would "idealise" after they have left this life. It can also happen in international affairs when people, albeit hopefully, try to idealise the dawn of what seems to be a new age. Internationally we have seen this recently in Europe with the overthrow of Communism and the re-unification of Germany. Perhaps rather romantically, people hoped such changes would usher in a new age of peace and plenty but the reality has proved rather different. Now we are witnessing the new peace initiatives between Israel and the Palestinian peoples together with their Arab neighbours. Again it is being heralded as the dawn of a new age. Others are more cautious. As one Israeli commentator has said, "This is the Middle East, where things are not always what they seem". It has been suggested this means peace in the region for the first time since the state of Israel was created in 1948. A more realistic view might put the date back to about 1300BC when the people of Israel under Joshua crossed the River Jordan and first captured the town of Jericho from the then local inhabitants. Ancestors of the present day Palestinian people.

It may be that the embryonic beginnings of parliamentary democracy in this country did begin with the rebellion of Simon de Montfort against the King however much he may have abused his position afterwards. We can only wait and see how much of the present hope in the Middle East is just a romantic ideal and how much it proves to be a reality.

Members gathered at the Village Hall thankful that the

heavy rain held off.

The speaker, Mrs. Guest, wished to give her talk early, so after the President, Mrs Sparrow, had welcomed everyone, Mrs Guest commenced her talk on 'Antique Samplers'. She first gave the history of samplers, why they were done and how they have helped historically. The idea came about in around the early 1500s, when the ladies of the church wished to convey a religious message along with the history of the church. From then on the women of the villages used this unique embroidery to record the local history and events. By 1700 it was often done by children because even if they could not read or write they could always sew. At that time women only went into service so the sampler was used as a reference for prospective employers. By 1800 with the expansion of village life the sampler became more of a pictorial record, often a plan of the village which was used in court to settle boundary disputes. The art of recording the family tree in this way has now died out and modern samplers are very rare. Mrs Guest then explained to the meeting the history of the samplers she had brought. Most of them from her own family history. One she framed to make a large picture and she told how it had been done in 3 sections by 3 different generations of her family. She finally explained that she was now retiring from public speaking and as her remaining family were not interested in preserving the samplers, she had decided to give the smaller ones to the County Federation and the large picture one to Denman College.

The meeting then proceeded with the business. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.. Mrs Sparrow reported that all had very much enjoyed the guided walk around Evesham and supper afterwards. She reminded members of the Group Meeting on 22nd Oct. at Ashton-under-Hill and the Anniversary Dinner at Hampton in Nov. All were thankful for their help to provide teas at the Flower Show and the mini-auction at the August meeting has raised £57. The Sec. informed those present that the

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD PCC MEETING SEPT 15th

The Flower Festival has once again been a great success giving a lot of enjoyment for over 1500 people and raising over £3000 towards the upkeep of the Church. Mrs Collis reported that this together with over £900 for Cream Teas was the reward for a lot of hard work for many people and vital funds especially as the Flower Festival was only held every three years.

The weather had been extremely kind to us that weekend and the attendance equalled the previous one despite many

other attractions in the area.

At the Diocesan Budget meeting, the Vicar said that it had been reported that the Church's finances had been seriously affected by the recent recession. For example a 1% drop in the interest rate was equivalent to a drop of £50,000, or the funds to support 3 clergy. It is therefore necessary to increase the quota we have to pay by at least 11.5% from £2788 this year to £3100 next. So, once again fund raising is the main issue that we have to address ourselves to, besides the spiritual matters concerning the church.

A letter from St John the Baptist church in Stockton on Tees has been received asking for financial support towards raising £100,000 for a Church Hall extension. The Vicar said that he received 3 or 4 letters a year of this nature which were difficult to ignore. Mrs Anne Poulter suggested that we might consider this request when deciding on charitable giving for the next financial year in November, especially when we had previously wondered how we could help deprived urban areas such as this one.

The sponsored 'Bike Ride' was held again this year, when 18 visitors signed in at the Church. This event has raised over £10,000 for charity in recent years and has proved a popular way of visiting many churches in the area and

raising money for a worthwhile cause.

Unfortunately there had been a spate of robberies from churches in the area recently which involved almost anything with a value that could be removed. It was agreed reluctantly that in future the Church will remain locked at all times other than Church Services or special occasions, pending advice from our insurers.

Further matters of security were discussed and would be

implemented if thought necessary.
