

THE VICAR'S LETTER

March 1994

My dear Friends,

"Haven" Lent Appeal - 1994

Many of you will have seen an article in the Evesham Journal about "Haven" (Homeless Action in the Vale of Evesham Now). "Haven" is an Evesham group trying to help the town's young homeless people and they are asking local people to help finance a building for homeless youngsters, due to be built in Mill Street.

The article described how the purpose-built complex will contain 13 bed-sits and a one-bedroomed flat and is to be built by English Church Housing in a project involving Wychavon District Council. "Haven" says that although it has not been asked to contribute towards the building costs, it needs to raise about £30,000 to furnish the units and about £20,000 to pay for the salary of a warden and the rent of the warden's flat. The article goes on to say how the organisation is sending letters to schools, churches, clubs and societies, asking for help. Their spokesman, Philip Walker has said, "If each organisation contributed £100, our problems would be at an end" A letter from "Haven" has been received by the benefice.

It has been agreed in both parishes to make this our Lent Appeal and donations in support of "Haven" may be given to either Mr R. Gregory in Badsey, or to Mrs C.Collis in Wickhamford, to the Vicarage, or at Church Services during Lent.

Homelessness has increased out of all recognition in recent years. Twenty years ago it was almost unheard of. Now it is a major social problem. Almost every town and city is affected by it. When young people find themselves homeless, often through no fault of their own, then the situation is desperate indeed. "Haven" is local and on our doorstep and is to be much admired for the way they are trying to help homeless young people here in the Vale. They thoroughly deserve our full support. Please help them as much as you can through our Lent Appeal.
