

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THE VICAR'S LETTER

May 1994

My dear Friends,

Elsewhere in this issue of the Parish Review you will see a letter recently received from the Church Commissioners concerning their financial affairs which have already so affected the Church of England. An Open Meeting is to be held in Wickhamford on Wednesday, 11th May in the Memorial Hall at 7.30pm to make the consequences more widely known for smaller parishes such as Wickhamford and to seek greater support for the church.

What is at stake? First, the future of the parish priest. There is a real possibility that within the next ten years the number of full time clergy in the area of Evesham will reduce from the present eleven to eight. We are now very concerned about the effect this may have upon the parishes, such as Badsey with Aldington and Wickhamford.

Secondly, the mission and presence of the church itself, and the influence the church has always had on the communities it is called to serve. The church represents christian moral principles and ethics which are basic to the health of society, community, family and personal life.

Thirdly, it is the church which provides pastoral care and counselling in sickness, loneliness bereavement and times of crisis, both through its parish priest and through the lay members of the church who also in their different ways represent the presence of the Risen Christ in their local community.

Fourthly, the church provides access to God at key points in our lives through the sacraments, at baptism, confirmation, holy communion, holy matrimony, at times of bereavement, and through forgiveness and reconciliation.

Fifthly, the church provides teaching about God, and his ways with us through its work in education and its schools, as well as through sermons and addresses, adult and Lenten study groups. It also directs and guides our

bible reading and prayer.

Lastly, the church provides regular communion with Christ, at the Sunday and weekday Eucharists. The life of the parish is undergirded by the prayers said regularly in the parish church. Prayers offered both for the world, the parish and for people in their individual and personal needs.

These are the things we enjoy through having a church. Many deplore the poor state of health in our communities, families and individual morality. The church and the christian standards and values it underpins seem the only way to improve the situation. Without the church

things can only get worse.

How much do you value these things? How much does Badsey and Aldington and Wickhamford value these things? The answer may well determine the future of the church in these parishes. It is an answer that can only be given by you as parishioners, through your increased support and commitment to the church and by your increased giving to the church. Failure will only result in a consequent decrease in all those good things the church provides for the life and worship of the community, the family and the individual. The choice is yours.

"D" DAY COMMEMORATIVE SERVICE OF EVENSONG

To mark the 50th Anniversary of "D" Day, a special "D" Day Commemorative service of Evensong will be held on Sunday, 5th June in Badsey Church. The hymns, readings, prayers and address will be chosen to commemorate this momentous event in the Second World War. All are welcome.

BADSEY CHURCHYARD (1)

To preserve the church's right of way through the churchyard, the lych gate will be locked on Monday, 2nd May for twenty four hours. The High Street entrance will remain open. It is hoped this will not cause parishioners too much inconvenience.

BADSEY CHURCHYARD (2)

Parents are again warned against the danger of allowing their children to play in the churchyard or take short cuts through the churchyard across the graves. Apart from the distress this causes parishioners, some of the older headstones may be unsafe. Should one fall on a child the consequences could be serious. Other than when visiting or tending graves, parishioners should keep to the path when walking through the churchyard.

OPEN MEETING - Wickhamford PCC, Wednesday, 11th May A reminder that an OPEN MEETING of Wickhamford Church PCC to which all parishioners are invited, is to be held in Wickhamford Memorial Hall on Wednesday, 11th May at 7.30pm, the purpose of which is to make more widely known the consequences of the recent losses sustained by the Church Commissioners on smaller parishes such as Wickhamford, and to seek greater support for the church in Wickhamford than at present. With the prospect of reductions in the number of clergy over the next ten years, and an increase in the amount parishes will have to find to support their churches and clergy, this is now a matter of urgent concern. If you live in Wickhamford and care about the future of your parish church this is a meeting you should attend.

MEMORIES OF WHITSUN

THE DAY WE WERE SPRING-CLEANED

Shoes were done with chalky white, petticoats in Reckitts Blue, then dipped in Robin starch. Little snow-white dresses lay on top of the petticoats, some with pins or stitches to help them fit better.

All the schoolgirls gathered in a bunch, the boys gathered behind and the brightly-coloured band led the

way.

The procession would advance slowly through the town - the drone of bagpipes filling every crevice of every street.

Whitsun is the official birthday of the Christian Church. It is a time of happiness, a time of ceremony. The whole town seemed to join in, tagging behind the main procession with its waving golden and cream banners and the glare of girls' white dresses.

Bobbing ringlets were a must. They were the subject of unvoiced competition between families. These ringlets were made by a mother's deft hands and plenty of rags. The straighter the girls' hair the more determined were the mothers that it should be curly - just for the day. Often ringlets could be seen being taken out of their rags while the child stood in the procession.

Whit was kept as one of the special times for the newly-baptised and confirmed, who would appear in white

for their ceremony.

After all, it was not an ordinary, average holy day cum holiday. It was the veritable spring-clean of the year for minds, bodies and spirits, manifesting itself in our behaviour and the style of our new summer clothes.

There were long, scrubbed kitchen tables laden with the best Delft and piled high with brawn and ham (with all the fat left on it); tinned red salmon and bright yellow tinned peaches would be ready for us (and anyone else who called) when we returned. All our energy had been spent on merely being good!
