

THE VICAR'S LETTER

November 1994

My dear Friends,

One of the great joys following the IRA Cease Fire in Northern Ireland has been the total cessation of funerals in the province appearing on our television screens. For 25 years, they have been an almost constant feature of the news bulletins. Now they have ceased, it is hoped forever.

This is a time of the year when we especially commemorate and remember those who died. In the church, All Saints Day falls on the 1st November, followed immediately afterwards by the Commemoration of All Souls. Days on which the Church celebrates and remembers those who rejoice with us but on another shore and in a greater light. Those who are forever with the Lord. In our national life it is a time when we remember those who laid down their lives in the cause of freedom. Those who died in the two World Wars and in the many other conflicts since, not least in Northern Ireland and elsewhere in Europe.

It is right that we should do this. For our freedom, our lives and the lives of our children and our grandchildren are built upon their lives and their sacrifice.

But we cannot spend all our lives living in the past. We cannot spend our time just remembering the dead. There is the future as well. Whilst our loved ones are ever in our thoughts and spiritually always with us, it is only in this life we are separated from them. In the sight of God, in the dimension of eternity, they are with us always and we with them.

It is in the resurrection of Jesus, in the light of the Risen Christ, we see this eternal dimension revealed for all time. In the presence of the Risen and Ascended Lord we see a vision of life that transcends time. Sadly, in this secular and materialistic day and age, many have lost this vision or never known it. With the decline of the spiritual dimension enshrined within our Christian beliefs, many are only aware of the things of this world. They have no awareness of anything which lies beyond. For them this is the only world there is. They have no hope of eternal life.

It is our faith in the Risen Christ, in the Living Lord, which brings this vital spiritual dimension into our lives. The dimension of eternity where the past, the present and the future become as one. Where with God, with the Risen Christ, we share with those who have gone before, in the life that is eternal, both now and in the world that is to

come.

Also they are changed frequently and, if there is any particular title required which is not on board it will be obtained at a very small charge. The van visits the villages of Badsey and Wickhamford on the FIRST and THIRD THURSDAYS in every month. Its stopping points and approximate times are:

After demonstrating how to prepare the goose for the oven she was thanked by Denny King.


