

THE VICAR'S LETTER

January 1995

My dear Friends,

First may I begin by just reminding you of the 700th Anniversary activities of Badsey Church taking place during the early part of 1995. There is the Combined Service of Evensong at St Leonard's Bretforton on Sunday, 8th January, when the Bishop of Worcester will be the preacher. Then there is the Civic Service at Badsey, on Sunday, January 15th, when the preacher will be the Revd Richard Armitage, Vicar of Evesham. This is followed on Sunday, 29th January, with the 700th Anniversary Family Service. After this, on Sunday 19th February, Mr Terry Sparrow will give a talk on the history of St James' Church, Badsey in place of Evensong.

Secondly, on Wednesday, 11th January, and Thursday, 19th January, Canon Sharon Swain will be visiting each PCC to talk about the Bishop's Book and "The Step Forward in Mission" all parishes are being asked to take during 1995,

the year of St Wulstan.

Thirdly, on a more mundane note, there will be no service of Matins in Wickhamford Church on Sunday, 22nd January, due to the preservation of the woodwork taking place during the previous week.

Lastly the Jehovah's Witnesses seem to have been targeting the benefice during recent months. Their beliefs are not the same as the Christian Church, although superficially they may seem to be similar. An article appears elsewhere in this Review outlining the differences and a booklet is also available. It may be ordered through the Vicarage, price 99p.

It is good to be engaged in these various activities but we must take care not to be overloaded by them. A glance at "Notes for your Diaries" for January reinforces this view. We need to be on our guard against the danger of "activism", of rushing around and being so busy that we have no time for God, or to be with God. So much so that He gets pushed out of the picture altogether. Indeed "activism" can become an end in itself. It can become a substitute for God. Something we prefer to fill our lives with instead of God.

With God all things are possible and with Him we shall be amazed at what can be achieved in His name. It will always be far more than we can do on our own, either as individual Christians or as a church. But we need to take "time out" to be with God for without Him we can do nothing. As the writer of Proverbs says, "In all your ways acknowledge him and he shall direct your paths" (Proverbs 3.6.) and as the Psalmist says, "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46.10). Amidst all the frantic activity of life around us in the world today we need to retain that inner peace and tranquillity which comes only from God. We recall the words of the prophet Isaiah, "For thus says the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel, "In returning and rest you shall be saved; in quietness and in trust shall be your strength" (Isaiah 30.15).

The Life and Times of St Wulfstan of Worcester

The 900th Anniversary of St Wulfstan's death in 1095 provides an occasion to learn about one of the key figures in the history of the diocese and cathedral of Worcester. Wulfstan's career as prior and bishop spanned the tumultuous years of the Norman Conquest and settlement. Yet he retained influence with successive kings, undertook the construction of a new cathedral and the reform of its community and emerged with a reputation as a saint.

In conjunction with the University of Birmingham three day schools are planned to reassess Wulfstan's career and achievements; his cathedral, its worship and music; and his diocese and chapter. They form part of the extensive celebrations of the Cathedral's "St Wulfstan Year" and each day school will be addressed by a team of leading scholars. They are to be held on Saturday, 28th January, 25th February and 29th April. Full details are available on the leaflets in each church or from the Vicarage.

A BRIEF MENTION

I am sure that many of you read in the "Evesham Journal" — as I did — of the way in which Kevin Waterhouse, and one of his young friends, rescued two people from a motor car which had left the road and subsequently burst into flames. Kevin is an eighteen year old who lives in School Lane, Badsey.

I knew about the incident before the report actually appeared in print. Kevin lives immediately opposite me and the day after the event I saw him in the street. I was surprised he was not at work and asked if he was on holiday. He then told me he was having time off on medical advice as his breathing was affected by smoke inhalation. Further enquiries more or less forced him into telling me what had happened — but I must say he did so in a most modest way and played it down as much as he could.

Let us make no mistake about this. If Kevin had to have time off because his lungs had been affected he and his friend must have put themselves at considerable risk. Such bravery is to be commended; especially when we hear so much on the minus side as far as teenagers are concerned. The truth is, of course, there is always far more good than bad wherever we look - it is just that what is bad seems to be more news worthy even if it is only the fringe element which perpetrates it.

Having said that I am sure we are all delighted to have such a young man in our village. We congratulate Kevin and his young friend on their bravery and extend to them both our thanks and every good wish.

Jehovah's Witnesses

Few people have not been called upon at least once by the Jehovah's Witnesses. They are door-to-door evangelists who are members of one of the most aggressive religious groups in the world. Originating in America, their world wide membership is now estimated as being 2.2.million people. Despite the lack of welcome received in many homes they march on determinedly to the next house. Those who do talk to them soon realise that their beliefs differ greatly from those of Christianity although at first this may not be apparent. They are strongly opposed to all forms of organised religion and this includes the Christian Church.

The Jehovah's Witnesses are probably best known for some of their practices. They are pacifists and refuse to serve with their country's military forces. They do not salute their national flag or celebrate Christmas, birthdays or other holidays because they believe these are forms of idolatary. In addition, they will not accept blood transfusions for themselves or members of their families because they think this violates the Old Testament prohibition against consuming blood.

They claim the Bible as their final authority. But it is not a Christian Bible. It is a Bible whose texts have been altered to suit their particular beliefs, namely those of their first leaders Charles Russell and "Judge" Joseph Rutherford whose own writings are regarded as taking precedence over

the Scriptures.

The Jehovah's Witnesses do not believe, as Christians do, in God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. Theirs is an Old Testament God, Jehovah. They do not believe that Jesus was God and that God was in Jesus. In many places they alter the text of the Bible to deny the divinity of Jesus. For example, at the beginning of John's Gospel where we read, "The Word was God, meaning Jesus was God, they read "The Word was a god" meaning that Jesus was just one among other gods. They have a different view of the Resurrection of Jesus. For them Jesus becomes a

"glorious spirit creature". So too with the Holy Spirit. For them the Holy Spirit is not the Third Person of the Trinity of God who expresses the intellect, emotion and will of God. It, as distinct from He, is only an invisible active force who moves Jehovah's servants to do his will.

The reason why the Jehovah's Witnesses are so assiduous in their witnessing is because they believe this will earn for them salvation and save them from eternal hell. But again Christians believe differently. Christians believe they are saved by God's grace and love, through faith in Jesus Christ. They believe in a God of Love who gave himself for them that they might have eternal life in him. As Paul says in his first letter to the Thessalonians, "For God has not destined us to the terrors of judgment, but to the full attainment of salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ. He died for us so that we, awake or asleep, might live in company with him". In their distorted view of the Bible and the Christian faith, the Jehovah's Witnesses offer no such hope or promise.

The Jehovah's Witnesses deny many fundamentals of the Christian faith including the deity of the Lord Jesus Christ. They are opposed to the Christian Church. In many areas their doctrines have departed from the teachings of the Christian Bible. Whilst we may admire their zeal and enthusiasm for their beliefs, and the very presentable, if persistent way in which they witness to them, they cannot be considered Christians or a part of the Christian Church. They witness only to their own beliefs and to no others.

There was no normal afternoon meeting at the Memorial Hall on Wednesday 7th December, but at five o'clock some forty-five members and two guests, the Rev. Peter and Mrs Mitchell, sat down to our annual festival dinner. To start the proceedings our Secretary kept us up to date with news of those who were unable to attend, some who were on winter holiday and some who were not too well; particularly Mrs Mary Mitchell, who is in hospital for a hip operation. Get well soon Mary, we look forward to your return. Birthday buttonholes were presented to Mrs Hearne, Mrs Kitcher, Mrs Sutton and Mr Chamberlain. By this time the seven stalwart ladies who had done all the preparation

and cooking of the food were ready to serve fruit cocktail starters, followed by very generous helpings of roast chicken with force meat stuffing, and five assorted vegetables, then mince and apple flan and ice cream and a cup of tea. While the workers and their husbands were clearing away and washing up the usual monthly raffle was held, but this time all the donated prizes were wrapped in festive paper so nobody knew what choice they had made until they were opened, except of course those who chose the very pretty table decorations.

Then it was entertainment time, and all the tables were cleared and stowed away to herald the appearance of the SHEEPTOWN DIPPERS, a team of teen-aged girl clog dancers accompanied by four adults with accordion and drums.
