

THE VICAR'S LETTER

February 1995

My dear Friends,

Badsey PCC is considering introducing a Family Eucharist in place of the Sung Eucharist on the 1st Sunday in the month. This will be a simpler form of Eucharist based upon services already used elsewhere in the diocese. A first celebration of the service will take place in the church on Wednesday evening 22nd February at 7.30pm. This will be a "pilot" form of the service to gauge initial reactions to it. Afterwards comments and suggestions will be welcome. All members of the church are invited to this service. If the response is favourable, and we hope it will be, the service will be introduced to our Sunday worship on Sunday 5th March, for a trial period of six months. Assuming it is well received the service will then become a regular part of our worship.

The service is aimed especially at the younger families young people and children of the parish and it is hoped, will provide a much needed "bridge" between the non Eucharistic Family Services which are always well supported and the regular Eucharistic worship of the Church. Increased participation by members of the congregation is also planned.

The celebration of the Eucharist will take place at a table positioned at the Chancel step and not at the Altar, and be centred around this point. Some adjustment to our usual practices will be necessary to accommodate this. But these should not cause any difficulties.

It is hoped that this form of Family Eucharist will be well received and help to attract more people to our services and increase the fellowship of the church. Like everything that is really well worthwhile, we shall have to work at it, and it will take time to grow. In the name of the Lord and for the furtherance of his kingdom, we hope it will bear much good fruit.

REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD PCC MEETING OF JANUARY 11th

The meeting was attended by the Revd Canon Sharon Swain who presented the aims and objects of the Bishop's 'A Step forward in Mission'. This will consist of a declaration of intent from all the Parishes in the diocese, about how they will endeavour to find new ways of reaching people inside or outside their own Parish. The book, when completed, will be presented to the Archbishop of Canterbury at a special service to be held in October at the Three Counties Show ground. In the discussion which followed, it was pointed out that it was particularly difficult to maintain our Church with the declining membership let alone undertake diversification. However, an approach to the village as a whole will be made in the near future to support the Church, and this could generate new ideas. Canon Swain agreed that we were not alone in this respect, and help from the Bishop's team was available along with quidelines for our discussions. Formal propositions are called for by May to identify what we hope to do.

Mrs Collis confirmed the amount we will have to pay in quota for the next two years namely £3196 and £3421.

At a recent meeting of Deanery representatives, including Mrs Collis, Mrs Baker, Ken Maden and the Vicar, the possibility of adopting a new formula for assessing the quota was discussed. Needless to say, parishes voted for the proposals which suited them best. The result was very much to the detriment of the benefice of Badsey with Aldington and Wickhamford. The Vicar subsequently had meetings with the Rural Dean and the Deanery Lay Chairman and made known to them the views of both parishes on how the decision had been taken and its implications.

Special Collections taken were for the Earl Haigh fund £39 and at Christmas £78 for the Church of England

Children's Society.

Mr Poulter confirmed that the preservation of all the woodwork in the Church was about to be undertaken by Dawsons of Cheltenham.

Due to the nature of the work the church would have to remain closed for 2 weeks.

The next meeting is the Annual General Meeting on March 8th when all will be welcome. D.G.P.

Whilst most of the interesting lecture was concerned with cases involving huge sums of money, Mr Johnson did impress on us to take great care of our various credit cards etc: and never divulge our personal identity numbers, or have copies of them in our wallets or handbags.

Following the talk refreshments were served and our monthly raffle numbers drawn, and we all went home. Not

very well attended but very enjoyable.

Next month we have a representative from SAFEWAYS coming to give us an insight on food distribution and maybe some samples of the 'goodies', so we hope our numbers will be back to normal.
