

My dear Friends,

Celebration of Faith, Three Counties Showground, Wednesday, 18th October at 7.30pm

As part of the Diocesan St Wulfstan Year 900th Centenary celebrations there will be a Celebration of Faith, at the Three Counties Showground, Malvern, on Wednesday, 18th October, 1995 at 7.30pm. This will be a service of worship in the presence of our Bishops and the Archbishop of Canterbury. The Archbishop will receive from Bishop Philip, the Bishop's Book containing our intentions towards a step Forward in Mission. Tickets for this event will be £2.50. It is hoped that as many people as possible will attend what will be a memorable diocesan service. The singing will be led by a choir of 500 voices. Tickets for the service will be allocated throughout the diocese on a first come first served basis. Within the benefice they may be booked through the Vicarage. Those wishing to sing in the Choir are asked to contact the Vicarage for details of rehearsals, etc. Facilities will be available for the disabled. Provided sufficient names are received from the two parishes, it is intended to arrange a coach from the benefice. Please book your tickets for the service and the coach through the Vicarage as soon

as possible. Cars may be taken but coach arrivals and departures will be given priority on the day. Due to safety regulations and for administrative reasons, people without a valid ticket for the service will be unable to gain entrance to this event. The cost of the coach will be additional to the tickets for the service. Please book now for this most memorable occasion.

BADSEY REMEMBRANCE HALL - APPEAL

Readers who were interested to see in the Evesham Journal the other week that the Hall was to receive a grant of £40,000 from 'Wychavon District Council will wish to hear

how the story continues!

Briefly, we wished to improve our facilities by providing new Ladies toilets and releasing more storage space; we also wanted to renovate the kitchen and gents cloakroom. However, in order to qualify for a grant, we had to provide facilities for the disabled. This would have increased the cost by more than the grant itself; nevertheless we did consider making a grant application to the County Council.

At this point we were confronted by a sequence of expensive demands from the Fire Authorities to install a

sophisticated alarm system (to the same standard as a large London Theatre) with which we managed to cope - but the toilet improvement had to be put on ice!

No sooner had we gathered our wits than we had another demand - to keep our Public Entertainments Licence so that simple plays or pantomimes or dances could be held we had to install a complete new lighting system over all the exits, plus signs indicating that the door was the way out. (At one stage it looked as if we would have to put these signs and lights inside each toilet cubicle in case the occupant was not able to find the door if the lights went out). You can imagine the cost of these works- about £1400 each). I must say that the Councils did give us 25% of the money. So the improvement project receded further and further into the future. We tried and succeeded to raise funds during this time, but as you can see, they were always swallowed up.

At this point, we were told that Wychavon District Council had quantities of money which had become available from asset sales and that the Council would be very keen to provide grants to a maximum of 75% of any improvement. They would also finance a feasibility study. It was suggested that we apply for as big an improvement as we could as this was a once in a life time opportunity for the village. Naturally we were very keen and co-operated with Wychavon in designing a scheme which would have renewed all the toilets, the kitchen and double-glazed the Hall. Additionally, an excellent extension on the side of the Hall would provide storage. In effect, the Village would have a new Hall. And remember, the Hall is presently being used more and more since we have tried to improve it by our own efforts, and in my view is a great asset to the village anyway.

In due course, the plans arrived and with the excellent co-operation of the Parish Council, who were prepared to make a valuable contribution to the cost, the application was made. Everybody understood that 75% grant was needed to make the project viable, but in case of problems, a separate application was made to the County Council, though traditionally they reduced their awards by the exact amount that was granted by other bodies - ie: if the District gave you £10 then the County didn't give you the £10 that they would have done on their own. You might

think that I would be crazy to apply in these circumstances to the County, but I must have been as I applied anyway - in the hope of course that they might still provide some

money.

The cost of the whole project was to be in the vicinity of £77,000 so we needed approx £50,000 to make the project work the balance being found from long term loans arranged by the Parish Council and some contribution from the Parish Council budget. It did seem that a fair amount of Wychavon money would revert to the inhabitants of a Wychavon village - Badsey. It was time that something came our way.

What happened? Well, the District Council decided to award us less than we needed to make the project viable. So it wasn't viable. They may as well have awarded us nothing at all. One hopes that all the other applicants were not dealt with in the same way, since the Council could have awarded hundreds of thousands of pounds, none of which

could ever be used!

Where are we now? Well, the Architects have had an interesting time drawing pictures of the Hall as it is now as it could have been in one of many possible futures. We have copies of these pictures - and they are really imaginative and good ideas. You are welcome to have a look at them - we could hang them up in the foyer. The disabled people, when they arrive, will unfortunately not yet have a special toilet. However, we can certainly guarantee that all users of the Hall will be able to find the door on their way out! Incidentally, we have further requirements for fire precautions some of which will not be too expensive (pictures of fire extinguishers by each fire extinguisher for those who do not know what they are for and to make it easier and quicker to find them) and the construction of plinths outside the doors (this after 40 years of the Hall's existence) so that persons do not step out on to a step. This last could prove quite dear.

All is not yet lost! We may be able to get County grant though here the problem is that it is only awarded on application of the Hall Committee, not the Parish Council, and the Hall committee has to have enough funds to cover the work (we don't as we spend all our money on keeping our heads above water as you can see) and we have to show evidence of specific fund raising. There is also an outside

possibility of money from the Rural Development Commission (believe it when I see it).

If we had enough money we wouldn't need a grant?? So there we have it. I do apologise if nothing seems to be happening but now you know the reasons why. I do hope that something does happen because as you can imagine, a lot of people have spent a lot of pretty expensive time on getting to this stage (absolutely nowhere at all) and this money could have been spent on the Hall anyway.

I shall keep you informed of progress. By the way, if someone could see their way to providing help or assistance

it would be gratefully accepted!!

WICKHAMFORD FRIENDSHIP CLUB

A good turn-out of thirty-nine members attended a most interesting and informative meeting at the Memorial Hall on Wednesday 5th April. Our secretary read out the normal notices of apologies, forthcoming events etc., and birthday buttonholes were presented to Mrs Sutton. Mrs Wardle and Mr Street. The main event of the afternoon was a talk by Mrs Freda Fitch on the subject of the West Midlands Air Ambulance. Mrs Fitch gave us an excellent description of the helicopter in use, and it's layout and medical equipment for rescusitation, emergency blood transfusions etc., and the work of the paramedics who fly to the emergencies, which of course are not only road accidents, numerous as they are, but all kinds of situations that require very swift and smooth conveyance of the patient to hospital. This may include farm accidents, heart attacks and all kinds of domestic calls that do not hit the newspaper headlines. The helicopter is not fitted with wheels, but with ski type runners which enable it to land on all sorts of rough terrain, and we were shown slides of it having landed on a motorway, a grass verge by a busy road, and even on a little grass roundabout on a housing estate. Mrs Fitch went on to speak of the financial aspect of running the service, and pointed out that although it was supported by the government for the first year, from then on it had to be self supporting, and quite often over the four years that it has been in operation there were times when it was doubtful if it could carry on for one more month. The cost of running the service is approximately £12-00 per minute,

which means that if the service is on call for eighteen hours a week, the annual cost is in the region of £650,000-00. All this money is raised by a dedicated band of unpaid volunteers, and I take the liberty of saying that it behoves all of us never to refuse to help in some small way, for we never know when we may need that ride.

After the talk tea and biscuits were served and the raffle drawn, and we went on our way at the and of a very pleasant afternoon. Next month, Wed May 3rd, there will be no normal meeting, but an afternoon coach trip to Cirencester is to be arranged, starting at the Sandys Arms at 1-45, don't be late.
