

### THE VICAR'S LETTER

October 1995

My dear Friends,

This month we turn to the St Wulfstan 900 Anniversary Celebrations of the Diocese. Already the Evesham Deanery Pilgrimage to Worcester Cathedral has taken place and at a most impressive Deanery Confirmation Service in the Cathedral eleven candidates from the benefice were confirmed. This was a source of special joy as six of the candidates had been baptised at Badsey since I came to the parish in 1980. As newly baptised members of Christ's flock their parents received the Mothers' Union Baptism Anniversary Cards and then with the support of the church and their families, they became actively involved with the Sunday School and Family Services. Their Confirmation therefore came as a fitting climax to their nuture and. growth in the Christian faith. We thank God for this and pray they will long continue Christ's faithful soldiers and servants unto their lives end.

October sees the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury to the Diocese and the "Celebration of Faith" at the Wye Hall, Three Counties Show Ground, on Wednesday, 18th October at 7.00pm; details of which have already been circulated to those concerned. The St Wulfstan Exhibition in the Cathedral is open until 21st October, and high quality Commemorative Tea Towels and Mugs are also available. A book has been published on St Wulfstan - His Life and Times and on Saturday, 4th November, the Final Service for the St Wulfstan Year will be held in the Cathedral, at which it is hoped clergy and representatives from all the parishes in the diocese will be present. Although within the benefice we have centred upon the 700th Anniversary celebrations at Badsey, a great deal has been happening elsewhere as part of the year of St Wulfstan and we pray this will bring to the diocese the same joy and encouragement, as our 700th Anniversary celebrations have brought to us.

Lastly, on a somewhat sadder note, it now appears almost certain that, following my retirement early next year the benefice will be divided, and Wickhamford will be linked with Broadway and Badsey with Offenham and Bretforton. This brings into question the future of the Parish Review from January onwards. It has been a most successful publication and very well supported by contributors, advertisers and parishioners alike. It has reflected two very active, hard working churches and parishes and I would like to thank all those who, through the years, have made this possible. I shall be talking to Canon Peter Burch and the Revd John Wright about arrangements to be made from January onwards and I know both PCCs are equally concerned. This will be just as soon as the future is more definite.

Visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury, 18th - 20th October

The Celebration of Faith will take place on Wednesday, 18th October at 7.00pm at the Wye Hall, Three Counties
Showground. Those travelling in cars should arrive from 6.00pm onwards and enter by the Red gate. A Loop system will be available at the front on the left hand front side of the stage. There will be tapes available of the service hymns and sermon. Orders will be taken afterwards.

St Wulfstan Exhibition at Worcester Cathedral. This is well worth a visit. It is in the Chapter House, and is open on Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 11.00am - 4.00pm. Admission free. The Exhibition closes on 21st October.

St Wulfstan - His Life and Times. This is the title of a new book about St Wulfstan edited by Philip Barker containing articles about his career, his miracles, Worcester during his life time, his Cathedral, the monastery, early Norman churches in the Diocese and manuscripts of his time. It is available from the Cathedral Gift, Shop or at the Exhibition, price £3.00. and makes a fitting memento of the Diocesan 900th Anniversary celebrations.

The Final Service for the St Wulfstan Year with Choirs from all over the Diocese will be held in the Cathedral on Saturday, 4th November at 3.pm. Clergy and representatives for all parishes in the diocese will be present.

MOTHERS' UNION

A few of us met in church on September 7th to take part in the World Wide Wave of Prayer, while other members took part from home. For half an hour we thought of, and prayed for our linked dioceses of Kigezi, N. Kigezi, E. Ankole, Minna, N.W. Australia and our own Worcester. Branches across the diocese each take a different time, ensuring a continuous wave of prayer reaching out to our World Wide members. We all felt a very real sense of

fellowship.

The Revd. Peter Mitchell gave a talk on our Patronal Saint James the Great, at our meeting on September 12th. We cannot be certain exactly when Badsey church became St. James. Before the Reformation many churches were dedicated to the Virgin Mary, afterwards moving away from the Roman Catholic influence to take a saints' name generally with some affinity to that parish. Our church would have become a parish church rather than a part of Evesham Abbey, so this could well be when it became St. James. The name James derives from Jacob (Hebrew) meaning "a man of guile". We were given an outline of James' family, how close he was to his brother John - 'sons of thunder' who were called from their fishing to follow our Lord. James bore witness to Jesus and was a great support to him, one of his closest friends. He was also a tower of strength, to the other

disciples. We know that he was killed 'by the sword' probably beheaded. Tradition says that his executioner was
so impressed by James and his teaching that he begged
forgiveness - received it - and became a Christian himself.
St James is said to have visited Spain to spread the gospel
and with large ships sailing the trade routes this could
easily be so. His relics were eventually taken to Santiago di
Compostela which became a centre of pilgrimage.

We thank our Vicar for answering our queries, we feel

we know a little bit more about our patron Saint.

Evesham Deanery have been asked to do a cake stall at the Craft Fayre, Malvern on Saturday October 21st. This is a special effort for the Francis Samuel Memorial Fund which hopes to renew/replace the MU caravan, so dear to her heart. Further details later.

### REPORT OF WICKHAMFORD PCC MEETING - SEPTEMBER 13th

The proposals for parish reorganisation following the retirement of the Vicar in January were thoroughly discussed with the Archdeacon at our last PCC Meeting in July. A letter was sent by the Churchwardens to the Diocesan Pastoral Committee expressing our concerns, but acceptance in principle. Unfortunately there are fewer Clergy available due to the drop in candidates for ordination. It is, therefore, necessary to group more parishes together to maintain a clerical presence. Under the proposals, Badsey will be grouped with Offenham and Bretforton, while Wickhamford will be administered by Broadway. The historical link with Badsey Church will therefore be broken and new arrangements will have to be made for joint ventures, such as this magazine. If there are no strong objections, we should know what has been decided in the near future. It was proposed that the Vicar of Broadway, the Canon Peter Burch and his wife should be invited to the Harvest Supper on October 11th if these proposals are confirmed by then.

Mrs Collis reported on a special meeting of the Deanery Synod called to discuss increased funding needed to employ staff in new positions in the Diocese. There was a strong feeling from all the Parishes that it was hard enough to raise the money for our present quota which had

been increased by 171% anyway.

A very creditable £696.42p had been raised in 10 sessions of Cream Teas, a very valuable contribution to our finances.

The Wickhamford Play Area Association have produced a tea towel depicting buildings and scenes in Wickhamford and asked if the Church could help to promote it. It was

agreed to display a poster on the notice board.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has been invited to a gathering of representatives of all Churches in the Worcester Diocese at the Three Counties Show Ground on October 18th. This is to be the climax of a year of celebration for the life of Bishop Wulfstan of Worcester.

The Vicar praised the organisation of the Confirmation Service at Worcester Cathedral when 3 of our parishioners, including Ken Maden, our Churchwarden, were confirmed by

the Bishop. G.P.
