

## THE VICAR'S LETTER

November, 1995

My dear Friends,

At a special meeting of Badsey PCC on the 19th October, at which representatives of Wickhamford were also present it was agreed to continue with the Parish Review during 1996. Details of the latest dates for copy etc., and to whom it should be sent will be given later. It was felt that although the two parishes may be under the care of different clergy there were still many things they shared together and that these should continue to be reflected in the Parish Review. Details of the price for 1996 will be given in the December issue in the normal way.

Now that the Revd John Wright will be leaving Offenham and Bretforton in the New year, it is assumed there will be an interregnum before a new incumbent comes to Badsey and that once the present pastoral reorganisation scheme is established Canon Peter Burch will take over the care of Wickhamford as planned. The Rural Dean will shortly be discussing with the Churchwardens of both churches arrangements for the interregnum. The next few months will be a testing time for the parishes during which the life of the church will have to be

sustained. But it will also be an opportunity. An opportunity to prove how strong and faithful the churches are in Badsey with Aldington and Wickhamford and how much God can do for them through their faith. There need be no fear or anxiety. The greater the challenge, the stronger our faith becomes. When we work together with God, we shall be amazed at what can be accomplished in His name.
