

THE VICAR'S LETTER

December, 1995

My dear Friends,

At a meeting of Churchwardens with the Rural Dean on Friday, 17th November at Offenham Vicarage, arrangements were made for the interregnum. In Wickhamford, together with the Church Wardens, Canon Peter Burch, Vicar of Broadway and the Revd John Hodgson, a retired clergyman now living in Broadway, will assist in the care of the parish until the new Pastoral Reorganisation scheme is approved. Similarly, in Badsey with Aldington, the Revd Eric Waterhouse, also a retired clergyman who lives in Evesham, will assist the Churchwardens, until an incumbent is appointed for the new united benefice of Badsey with Aldington, Offenham and Bretforton. In all probability therefore, this will be the last Christmas of the present united benefice of Badsey with Aldington and Wickhamford. The Christmas Services are as in previous years, and details are shown elsewhere in this Review. A Thanksgiving Celebration of Holy Communion will be held on St John the Evangelist's Day, Wednesday, 27th December at 11.00am. to mark the actual anniversary of the first recorded dedication of a church in Badsey by the Bishop of St Asaph in the year 1295. It will be a fitting end to the 700th Anniversary year with its highlights of the visit of the Archbishop of

Wales and Bishop of St Asaph, together with the Bishop of Worcester in July, and the 700th Anniversary Flower Festival and Songs of Praise in August. The Confirmation Service in Worcester Cathedral in September and the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury to the diocese in October as part of the 900th Anniversary celebrations of St Wulfstan all combined to make 1995 a year to be long remembered.

But what of the future? As I write this letter, I look again at the theme of our readings for 6th Sunday before Christmas, "The Promise of Redemption, Moses," and think of the time when the people of Israel were trapped in a seemingly impossible situation. In front of them stretched the impassable waters of the Red Sea. Behind them were the Egyptians intent on taking them back into captivity under Pharaoh. All seemed lost. There were those who wanted to surrender and give in. But then Moses their deliverer speaks in words upon which the whole of the 14th chapter of Exodus seems to focus. "Fear not, stand firm, and see the salvation of the Lord, which he will work for you today; for the Egyptians whom you see today, you shall never see again. The Lord will fight for you, and you have only to be still". Suddenly the impossible happens. A strong east wind arises and divides the waters. The Israelites pass over to safety. The Egyptians pursue them, only to be trapped and drowned as the waters of the Red sea return to their normal place. The faith of Moses is justified. The people of Israel are delivered and saved.

At Christmas in the birth of Jesus, we celebrate an even greater deliverance. The deliverance not just of a crowd of rebellious Israelites on the shores of the Red Sea but of mankind. The deliverance of mankind from the tyranny of sin and death. But again in the most unexpected way imaginable. In the birth of an infant child in a stable in Bethlehem. A birth in which God miraculously took upon himself our frail human form and came among us as the Word made flesh. That through faith in Him, we too might be saved. We too might see the salvation of the Lord. This is the good news of Christmas. The good news that in love and humility, Jesus came to be our Saviour and our Lord, our Redeemer and our Friend. One who through faith in Him

delivers us from the darkness of sin and death into the light and joy of his eternal kingdom. May this be a truly happy and joyous Christmas for us all.

How are hymns chosen each week? By the Vicar, or the organist, the choir, by popular request — or does someone use a pin? We heard how several of the well known hymns came to be written; for instance The Old Rugged Cross — a staunch favourite was written by a USA methodist, formerly a Salvation Army officer in the first World War. A P.O.W. — a Scotsman — was on the run in France when he found himself in a narrow lane, everything so dark and menacing, odd creaks and noises, and he himself at a very low ebb. He saw a shadow — and next moment felt the outline of a stone cross. He was overcome with tears of bitter loneliness, he embraced the cross and prayed.

Gradually he grew calmer and had a wonderful sense of peace and safety. After a while he continued along the lane to a farmhouse, where a French patriot took him in. The Cross is indeed a safe refuge to all. The old familiar hymns give us a feeling of safety and security – a continuation – bringing people together in praise and worship. Many hymns can be sung eight or ten different tunes – all in various hymn books under various numbers, which can lead to confusion with occasionally dire results! We joined together to try hymns sung to popular tunes, and to our surprise found they went extremely well. A highly informative and amusing talk. I feel many of us will now view the church hymn board through different eyes.

There was a good number of members at the afternoon meeting (Nov. 14) when we welcomed a member from Leeds, now living at Broadway. After the opening hymn and prayers there were several notices etc. Our World Wide (formerly Overseas) Box Collection had raised £190 thank you everyone for your continued support.
