

THE VICAR'S LETTER

January, 1996

My dear Friends,

It is with very mixed feelings I begin this letter to you. First Pat and I would like to thank all those who have very kindly wished us a long and happy retirement. And it is my prayer that your love may abound more and more with knowledge and discernment, so that you may approve what is excellent, and be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the fruits of righteousness which come through Jesus Christ, to the glory and praise of God" (Phil.1. vv 3 - 11)

SPECIAL JOINT NOTICE Preparation of New Church Electoral Rolls in 1996

The preparation of New Church Electoral Rolls is required to take place in each parish prior to the AGMs held in 1996. The

preparation of the new Church Electoral Roll for Wickhamford will take place on Tuesday, 20th February and for Badsey on a date yet to be announced. New application forms will be sent to those whose names are included on the present Church Electoral Roll of each parish. They will also be available from the Church Electoral Roll Officers, Mrs P.M. Baker of 57, Pitchers Hill in Wickhamford and Mrs Joan Betteridge, of "Byways", 6, Chapel Street, Badsey, and in each church.

Completed forms should be returned to the Church Electoral Roll Officers as soon as possible, but not later than Friday 16th February in Wickhamford and in Badsey, by a date yet to be announced. The new rolls will be published at least 14

days prior to each Annual Meeting.

Any person is entitled to be on the Church Electoral Roll of a parish if they -

(i) are baptised and aged 16 or over;

- (ii) have signed a form of application for enrolment; and EITHER
- (iii) are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish, or not being resident in the parish, having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment;

 OR
- (iv) are members in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribe to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves to be also members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

Under Synodical Government the Church Electoral Roll is important as it constitutes the voting base of the Church of England. It determines the number of Lay Representatives at Deanery, Diocesan and General Synod level and may be used in calculating the Quota allocation of a parish. It is also used when determing the number of full time clergy throughout the Dioceses

and within a Diocese. It may also be used when considering any local pastoral reorganisation of churches and parishes.
