

Afterwards our Leader, Mrs. Christine Davies, thanked the vicar for his help and support during his years at Badsey; for his guidance and courteous help and for being with us on so many occasions. Pat was thanked for her hard work and loyalty serving us for six years as Enrolling Member; and further time as a committee member. We shall miss their caring and sharing ways which have endeared them to us all. We drank a toast before presenting Pat with flowers, and a hand crafted Lazy-Susie together with a garden voucher to Peter. Peter thanked us for our gifts and good wishes and said how impressed he had been as he came to understand our aims and objects and saw how we tried to fulfil our promises in our day to day living.

The Buckle Street Hand Bell Ringers entertained us with a wide selection of tunes, some of which we were able to sing or hum, and all were thoroughly enjoyed. Interested members were able to ask questions and try the hand bells before we left for home. Many left clutching raffle prizes, thanks to the generosity of our

members, - altogether a happy evening.

Our afternoon meeting on 13th February was very well attended. We welcomed Mrs. Rita Harrison (Aldington) and hope that she will join us as often as possible with a view to becoming a member. Much of the business concerned dates listed below, and a rough count of members hoping to attend the Diocesan Festival on 21st May to enable us to book a coach.

Please remember our Easter Fayre being held on Friday, 29th March. Cakes, preserves, cards, handiwork, small Easter gifts, Bring and Buy and a raffle. Tickets available next meeting. Proceeds divided between the P.C.C. Project (Overseas) training a nurse in Nazareth; and our own M.U Project – to give a New Testament to all brides married in St. James' Church, Badsey.

Mr. Aiden Webster told us of his urge (in his early twenties) to serve God, not as a priest, but by taking his faith out to the ordinary people. Being an Anglican the Church Army seemed to be the answer, for they served the whole breadth of Anglicanism. A varied training reflected the wide aspect of their work; dealing with the homeless, elderly, youth, counselling, hospitals, the forces, prisons, beach missions, helping clergy with projects of 'Outreach' etc. He worked with the homeless (London) at day care centres, emergency night accommodation (also longer term) with psychiatric

care teams which lead patients to gain enough independence to resettle. For the 16 to 19 year olds there was a hostel and a street team who helped build up trust and long term relationships. These people had spiritual as well as bodily needs and he felt that this had sometimes been overlooked. Mr Webster considered Evangelism was his calling while other members felt drawn to help within the ministry – there was ample room for everyone to use his talents.

The Church Army has no church funding and relies upon donations from local Anglicans. Unfortunately there has been a 12% decrease over the last year or two although the number of legacies went up. Many M.U. members do hold boxes (the local collection in 1995 was £207). Several members offered to be new box holders so we hope to increase the donation from this parish.
