

At our May meeting members discussed three resolutions that had been put forward for consideration to be carried through to Government. These were for a more reasonable grant to be paid to

university students to help reduce the number of students leaving university with a degree but also with a large debt due to the fact that they have had to have loans just to be able to live and pay their rents while studying.

The second called for more N.H.S. dentists as many had dropped N.H.S. patients and in many areas people had to travel quite far and at some expense to get N.H.S. treatment. This could mean a high rise in poor dental care and hygiene – including children – if people on low incomes or at work cannot afford the time and expense to travel to visit a N.H.S. dentist.

The third resolution requests the Government to introduce cookery, hygiene, budgeting and parenting skills into the National Curriculum as it was felt that the lack of these skills resulted in poor parenting, financial instability and unhealthy living when young people married and had families – this could put burdens and stress in family units.

Lorraine Goodman and Sheila Taylor gave a humorous and informative account of their weekend spent at Denman College on a course studying reflexology. An intensive course from which they learnt a lot whilst having fun and a break from the daily chores!

Yvonne Haynes told members that she hoped to arrange a weekend in York in the Autumn and a theatre outing to London to see "Les Miserables". Lorraine had organised an outing to Boots in Nottingham in June and Sheila Knight was taking a party of members to see some bluebell woods followed by a drink and meal at a local "inn". Three of our members had entered in a group handicraft class at the Home Economics Rally being held at Perdiswell so good luck was wished to Hazel Stewart, Stephanie Hartley and Lorraine. Hazel and her daughter Jeanette had also entered floral classes and best wishes were sent to them.

One of our founder members, Mrs. Gertie Cowley, was celebrating her 90th birthday and best wishes had been extended to her.

Mrs. Sheila Taylor conducted a lively mini auction which raised approximately £65.00 for our funds - well done Sheila!

Common land, which had been available for all to farm, now belonged to a few wealthy land owners. He also told us about roads and the turnpike system, where tolls were collected to pay for the maintenance of the roads. We have Badsey Pike today as a reminder of this system. Then we were told about The Poor Law Amendment Act when parishes too small to administer relief joined with others and the Evesham Union was begun and a workhouse built in Evesham. Finally Terry entertained us with stories of the early

school in Badsey. Even then there was a lot of misbehaviour and truancy. Excuses for truancy included football matches, Sunday School outings, pea and hop picking and visits to the mop. This was a very enjoyable evening and many thanks go to Terry for his excellent research

At our meeting on 14th May our speaker was Mrs. Esmé Seaman. Her subject was "Foods of the Bible" and we were told of the various foods eaten in biblical times. Only meat from cloven footed animals that chewed the cud could be eaten. Also, only fish with fins and scales; and insects with no more than four legs, which hopped; were allowed. A variety of fruits, vegetables, spices, herbs and dairy produce was also eaten. There were many rituals connected with food in the Bible and food itself was of great importance. Esmé said that we should look on our food as a gift from God. Sandra thanked her and gave her a small gift of loaves and fishes – in keeping with her talk – which caused great hilarity.

We then had tea and a piece of "Scripture Cake" provided by

our speaker.

As the Memorial Hall was not available for the normal monthly meeting on Wednesday 1st May, a coach trip and visit to the Severn Trent Campion Hills Water Treatment Works at Leamington was arranged and supported by thirty-seven members. One birthday buttonhole was presented to Mrs P White on the coach.

On arrival at the works, (after a slight "coming together" with another vehicle), we were met in the reception area by Mr Roy Merry, superintendent of the works, who was about to entertain us with a most enjoyable and interesting account of the work carried out on the site. He opened by surprising us by the fact that the average consumption of household water is over twenty-eight gallons per person PER DAY. He went on to demonstrate by slides and a video all the scientific and technical processes that water is subjected to in order to make it fit to drink, far too detailed to include in this report, even if I could remember all that was said. During the proceedings there was a short sharp thunder storm which rather dis-suaded some of the less active members from going walk about round the plant to actually see the changes in the water as it passes from one section to another, millions of gallons a day. Returning to the lecture room we had a brief 'any questions' session and then we were served with light refreshments, before boarding the coach and heading for

home. A very successful afternoon.

Next month, June 5th, our speaker will be an officer from Long Lartin Prison, who will talk about the problems of drug smuggling, and he will bring along a specially trained dog give us a practical demonstration.
