Although its direct impact on us has been relatively small, the autumn of 1999 marks a very important anniversary for Eastern and Central Europe. It is now ten years since the mass demonstrations which lead to the collapse of the communist regimes in a number of countries, to the breaking down of the Berlin Wall, the opening up of the Border between the East and the West and the eventual reunification of Germany.

Just a few days before writing these words I found myself wandering across the line of the former boundary, still littered with concrete foundations. On the one side of the former border people can once more go to the top of the mountains which had become a military communications centre and on the other side, a ski resort is being refurbished.

It is difficult for us to imagine the dramatic changes in lifestyle and social outlook which have been caused by the above events. The visits earlier this year by members of our partner Churches in villages near to Halberstadt in Eastern Germany would have been impossible just ten years ago and they are still having to adjust to the tremendous changes not only in lifestyle but also the career prospects of young people. All teenagers with any career ambitions see the English Language as vital to their future and they are desperate to practice whenever possible.

The impact on the Church has also been interesting. In the former East Germany, the Church was frowned upon by the state, but not actively persecuted. People joined the Church as a sign of hope. It was the only organisation which could get away with any sort of stance which was not pro-government. In many cities it was the Churches which provided a focus for the antigovernment demonstrations. It is also notable that these demonstrations were largely peaceful in their nature.

Now, however, with the advent of a freer way of life, Church life is very much the same as in Britain. Yet the Church is vital to society. It may exist to worship God, but it is the one body which national politicians watch with a wary eye, for unlike individuals it can speak out and be both noticed and reported. Although it is also far more, the Church can act as a moral watchdog against a state which has gone astray. It can serve as a check against the excesses of a corrupt regime.
