# St James, Badsey with Aldington

# **Parish Newsletter**

April 2002

Back in the early days of the Christian Church, its leaders spent a great deal of time sorting out exactly who Jesus was and what it meant for Him to be called Son of God. The answer was The Trinity - the idea that the Christian understanding of God is that of Father, Son and Holy Spirit who together make up the one true God. Jesus is therefore both the Son of God and also God Himself temporarily living in human form. In St John's Gospel He is described both as Son of God and as God from God. This has been the Christian belief for almost two thousand years and many people have died defending it against those who would change it because it does not suit their own views.

Last month I promised that I would write something on suffering and these beliefs are key to the understanding of suffering. If we look around us, then it is quite clear that the world in which we live goes wrong. It goes wrong both in the way in which people sometimes treat each other and through natural disasters and incurable diseases. In the process people often suffer through no fault of their own. This then raises the question that if we believe in a God of love, how can God allow such suffering and why God allows the world to be the way it is?

The answer comes in two parts. The first is that the world has freedom built into it. God does not force us to act in a particular way. At every point in our lives, we have the freedom to choose and God does not force our hand. Without this freedom we would live lives of complete boredom and would never have the ability to make decisions for ourselves. A similar sort of freedom also applies to the natural world as it develops and evolves. However, this freedom also means that we can make wrong decisions, natural disasters can occur and incurable diseases can emerge. God had to give us boredom or allow the risk of suffering.

However, God is not content to let us suffer. So, God consents to share in our suffering. God Himself comes as a human being and experinces human life. In the end, He allows us to kill Him in God the Son and to disrupt His life of The Trinity. On The Cross, God experinces for Himself what it is like to be a part of the world and to suffer. God's gift of freedom allows the possibility of suffering, but God Himself shares in that suffering. Then, through His rising to new life He defeats death and brings us the promise that we too can share in the everlasting life of His love beyond the death which ultimately awaits us all here on earth.


