

The Sandpiper

She was six years of age when I first met her on the beach near where I lived. I drive to this beach, a distance of 3-4 miles, whenever the world begins to close in on me. She was building a sandcastle or something and looked up, her eyes as blue as the sea. 'Hello' she said. I answered with a nod, not really in the mood to bother with a small child.

She said 'I'm building'.
I could see that. 'What is it?'
I asked, not really caring.
'Oh I don't know I just like th

That sounds good I thought, and slipped off my shoes.

A sandpiper glided by. 'That's a joy' the child said.

'It's a what?'

It's a joy. My mama says sandpipers come to bring us joy.' The bird went gliding down the

Goodbye joy - I muttered to myself. Hello pain. And turned to walk on. I was depressed. My life seemed complete out of balance.

What's your name? She just wouldn't give up.

'Robert' I answered. 'I'm Robert Peterson'.

'My name is Wendy and I'm six'. 'Hi, Wendy'.

She giggled. 'You're funny' she said, in spite of my gloom, I laughed and walked on. Her musical giggle followed me. She called: 'Come again Mr. P. We'll have another happy day.'

The next few days consisted of a group of unruly Boy Scouts, PTA meetings and an ailing mother. The sun was shining one morning as I took my hands out of the dishwasher. I need a sandpiper I thought to myself, gathering up my coat. The ever-changing balm of the seashore awaited me. The breeze was chilly but I strode along,

trying to recapture the serenity I needed.

'Hello Mr. P' she said. 'Do you want to play?'

'What did you have in mind?' I asked with a twinge of annoyance.

'I don't know. You say.'

'How about charades?' I asked sarcastically. Her giggling laugh burst forth again.

'I don't know what this is.'

Then let's just go for a walk. Looking at her I noticed the delicate fairness of her face.

'Where do you live?' I asked. 'Over there' she said and pointed to a row of summer cottages.

'Where do you go to school' I asked. 'I don't go to school. Mummy says we're on vacation.' The little girl chatted the whole time as we strolled along the beach. My mind was on other things. When I left for home Wendy said, it had been a happy day. Feeling surprisingly better, I smiled at her and agreed.

Three weeks later, I rushed to my beach in a state of near panic. I was in no mood to even greet Wendy. I thought I saw her mother in the porch and felt like demanding she keep her child at home. 'Look, if you don't mind,' I said crossly when Wendy caught up with me, 'I'd rather be alone today . 'Why?' She asked.

I turned to her and shouted: 'Because my mother died'. Then I thought why was I saying all this to a little child?

'So this is a bad day' she said quietly. 'Yes' and yesterday and the day before' I said.

'Did it hurt? She enquired.

'Did what hurt?' I was exasperated with her, and with myself.

'When she died?'

'Of course it hurt!' I snapped as I strode off wrapped up in myself. 'Just go away.'

A month or so after that, when I next went to the beach, she wasn't there. I felt guilty, ashamed and admitted to myself that I missed her. I went up to the cottage after my walk and knocked at the door. A drawn looking young woman with honey coloured hair opened the door. 'Hello' I said 'I'm Robert Peterson. I missed your little girl today and wondered where she was.'

'Oh yes, Mr Peterson, please come in. Wendy spoke of you so much. I hope she didn't bother you. If she was a nuisance please accept my apologies'.

'Not at all, she was a delightful child' I said, suddenly realising that I meant what I had just said.

'Wendy died last week, Mr. Peterson. She had leukemia. Maybe she didn't tell you. The poor man was struck dumb and groped for a chair

'She loved this beach. So when she asked to come, we couldn't say no. She seemed so much better here and had a lot of what she called happy days. But in the last week or two she declined rapidly' Her mother's voice faltered as she said 'She left something for you. She went and fetched a smeared envelope with 'Mr P' written in childish letters. Inside was a drawing in bright crayons-a yellow beach, a blue sea and a brown bird. And underneath was written: A SANDPIPER TO BRING YOU JOY.

Tears welled up in his eyes and a heart that had almost forgotten to love opened wide. He just put his arms around Wendy's Mum and said 'I'm so sorry' over and over again



GARDENING TIPS

General: Dry spells may occur now and can cause all □ sorts of problems. Newly planted specimens are particularly vulnerable so take care to keep up watering if there is a prolonged period without rain. ☐ For the veggie garden If you have an established clump of rhubarb in your garden and have been

□ harvesting the tasty leaf stalks regularly throughout spring, it would be a good idea to take one more crop before letting the plant have a recovery period over the summer months. If you continue picking, the plant will

become weakened and lose its vigour, so producing a smaller crop next season.

For the plants: Many early flowering plants will produce subsequent flushes of bloom if they are regularly deadn headed. This is a very simple technique of picking off

the dead flowers. This makes sure the plant puts all its energies into producing further flowers.

Visitors: Now the warmer weather entices evening activity from insects and grubs, the predators are also \square out and about. The shy hedgehog can be lured to your \square patio with a plate of canned dog food. Keep

□ competitors away by covering the plate with an inverted □ plastic flowerpot. Hedgehogs normally breed in early

summer, and usually have four or more young in each □ litter.

With summer approaching here are a couple of old fashioned thirst quenchers, made for hot days Both drinks benefit from leaving for a week before using.

Fresh Lemonade

4 Lemons 2lbs Sugar 1 tsp Tartaric acid 2 pints of boiling water

Squeeze lemons over sugar Add the acid Pour on the boiling water. Stir well and leave till cold Bottle, then dilute to taste

Nettle Beer

2lbs Young Nettles 1lb Demerara Sugar

2 Lemons 8 pints of water

1oz Cream of tartar

1 oz of yeast

Rinse nettles, drain and boil for 15 minutes Strain into bowl containing the peel and juice of lemons making sure all pith is removed and mix with the sugar and cream of tartar.

Stir well and cool.

Add yeast, cover for 3 days with a cloth

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

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PEOPLE PROFILE

Napoleon once said that 'England is a nation of shopkeepers'.

George Singh Sangha and his family are the very kind of people who Napoleon must have had in mind when he said those immortal words.

George was born in Edgbaston, Birmingham and on leaving school went to Kingston University for Business Studies. On getting his degree George didn't want to join his family business working in one of their shops (he didn't know about Napoleon then) so instead went to work for BMW at Longbridge. However, with his business head

George could see the car industry in Birmingham dying and left his job in 1996.

George's uncle had a shop in Fairfield. Evesham and when George didn't know what to do with himself when he left his job his uncle suggested he work for the family business for four weeks to help him out. George said this felt good, everybody talked to one another and were very friendly

George didn't want to work in Birmingham and in 1997 George and his brother got together and bought the shop in Badsey. It was a small shop then but George extended it and brought the Post Office into the shop and made it into one.

George feels happy and fulfilled with his business. He likes the people and the community spirit. He says it's uplifting and positive and so different from the City. All George's family are still in Birmingham and George commutes every day with his wife and aunty. They leave Birmingham at 4.30 a.m. to get the papers sorted and the baking done. They don't usually get home until about 6.00 p.m. but this varies dependent on the amount of work. George said he could not do this without his marvellous staff. He used to have three other shops in the area, Honeybourne, Littleton and Harvington but he sold these saying it was too much to keep an eye on. George worries about his staff if the Post Office part of the business has to close. George thinks the community spirit in the village has much to do with the vicar, Richard, and says he is the best thing that has happened to the village. There's a unity in Badsey with the fetes and flower shows with everyone doing their bit. George had a son in July 2005 which he says has changed his life. He would like him to grow up in Badsey. So who knows Badsey may get a new permanent resident family. We look forward to that.
