

Firstly may I thank everyone who voted for me on 3rd May in the local elections. It was encouraging that the turnout was up by approximately 8% over the last District Council election. I will work on behalf of all the electorate in the Badsey ward and take on board all your views

As you may already know the housing development at Badsey Fields Lane was approved at the last Development Control meeting. When the site is sold the developer may well return to the Planning Committee to alter the layout

With regard to the Post Office both Peter Luff and myself will be keeping a close eye on the situation. Under the present criteria the post office should stay open.

With regard to the proposed Honeybourne Airfield development, in conjunction with my colleague, who represents Honeybourne and Pebworth, we have arranged a meeting, to which all Parish Councils affected will be invited. It will be addressed by the Head of Planning and their transport consultant.

Dear All.

Eight members from across the Benefice have just returned from Germany having visited friends from our Partnership Church in the former

East Germany. It was a short and quite hectic visit with a lot packed into a short space of time. One of the highlights for me, was the visit to Dresden where we visited the newly rebuilt Cathedral which bombed during the war, this was the completion of a process we started last year when our German Partners visited us and together we visited Coventry Cathedral, also bombed during the war. Coventry and Dresden have over the years forged a firm link and friendship, with regular contact between the two.

The cross on the Altar in Dresden Cathedral was in the form of the 'Coventry Cross' (the original being made out of nails found in the rubble after the bombing in Coventry), it was made by the son of one of the pilots involved in the bombing raids over Dresden. To me this symbolized reconciliation in a very practical way.

As I write this letter the leaders of the worlds richest nations are gathered at the G8 Summit (also in Germany), although I have not yet had time to read the details it appears that they have agreed to seek "substantial" cuts in emissions in an effort to tackle climate change. No mandatory targets have been agreed as I understand it, only the agreement to 'substantial cuts' - whatever that means. I know that the initial press reaction has not been favourable (in that the agreement does not specify any targets or time-scale) and I understand that it is difficult to monitor progress if there are no targets or deadlines to work to. But it does all. represent a huge step forward towards reconciling the differences

between the European, USA, and developing nations, points of view. History of past success (of G8 agreements) is limited as it was at the last G8 meeting in Gleneagles in 2005 that they agreed to wipe the debts of 18 African countries and announced \$50bn boost to aid for Africa; neither of which has not been funded as well as people had hoped or expected, nonetheless these targets have been also renewed this year.

Reconciliation is a slow process which needs the trust of all concerned; in a Christian sense, reconciliation comes about when we say sorry for the wrong we have done and we are forgiven by God, let us all pray that the differences between the nations can be reconciled once and for all.

In my day, an extra hour in bed on Boxing Day was considered sufficient. Curates are clearly paid much more these days; perhaps rather too much. While your week after Christmas was spent falling down mountains at excessive speeds, mine was used with the traditional activity making of apologies.

BADSEY W.I. CELEBRATES ITS 80TH YEAR

Badsey W.I. was founded in Badsey in March 1927 and was affiliated to the National Federation of Women's Institutes in November 1927. Its foundation was instigated by Mrs. Boucher of Badsey who became its President with Mrs. Carter of Wickhamford as its Vice President and Miss Ella Jones of Badsey as Secretary. At the time of its foundation there was a population in Badsey of 1,013 and a population of 305 in Wickhamford. The WI was known as Badsey/Wickhamford WI until the time that Wickhamford started its own.

Meetings were first held in the home of Mrs Boucher in the afternoons and members took their children along with them. As membership increased it moved to the Old School (now the site of Badsey British Legion Club). It then moved to The Wheatsheaf Inn, The Bell Inn (no longer in existence) and then across the road at the school. After completion of the Remembrance Hall in 1956 Badsey W.I. started to hold their meetings there and still do to this day, clocking up over 50 years of monthly meetings at the Hall.

The format of the meetings has changed little, but the activities have moved with the times. From learning to make hats, baby clothes, bottling preserves, turning collars and cuffs, and the famous jam making to jewelry making, photography, environmental issues, cookery, crafts of all kinds, keep fit and health and beauty.


From activities such as country dancing, drama, choirs and even a skiffle group, to walking groups, holidays abroad, week-ends away, sky diving (for the very brave!), college courses and sports of all types.

Badsey W.I is still active in all things to do with the village community as well as issues that affect the day to day living of people throughout Britain, especially women and children, having a very large voice that the Government listen to and take note of and in many instances act upon.

The essence of the W.I. was and still is fun, friendship and education with perhaps today a little more emphasis on fun and friendship.

Members will celebrate this auspicious birthday with a celebratory lunch in the Remembrance Hall on Saturday 4th August.

Badsey WI has a membership of over 50 and we are always pleased to welcome anyone who would like to come along to any meeting and see what we are all about. We meet on the second Wednesday of each month at 7.15.p.m. at the Remembrance Hall, so do come along, you can be sure of a warm welcome and an interesting evening.



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THE BEGINNINGS OF SCOUTING

Lord Robert Baden-Powell of Gilwell (1857-1941) was a decorated soldier, talented artist, actor and free-thinker. Best known during his military career for his spirited defense of the small South African township of Mafeking during the Boer War, he was soon to be propelled to extraordinary fame as the Founder of Scouting.

He had been impressed during the siege at how boys had used their initiative under pressure to make themselves useful and capitalize on limited resources. Already thinking of developing a training programme for young people in Britain, he was urged by friends to re-write his handbook for soldiers (*Aids to Scouting*) for this younger audience.

In 1907 he held an experimental camp on Brownsea Island, Poole, Dorset, to try out his ideas. He brought together 20 boys, some from public schools and some from working class homes, and put them into camp under his leadership. The whole world now knows the results of that camp.

Scouting for Boys was published in 1908 in six fortnightly parts at 4d a copy. Sales of the book were enormous and boys soon formed themselves into Scout Patrols. What had been intended as a training aid for existing organizations became the handbook of a new and, ultimately, worldwide Movement. B-P's great understanding of young people obviously touched a fundamental chord both in this country and others. In September 1908, B-P set up an office to deal with enquiries pouring in about the Movement.

Scouting for Boys has since been translated into many different languages and dialects.

Some 28 million young people worldwide now take part in the adventure of Scouting and in 2007 the Movement celebrates its centenary.



□ General With the holiday season coming up, keep on top of routine jobs such as cutting the lawn and tidying beds

□ and borders, so that you do not come back to a neglected looking garden after your holiday.

☐ Pond Patrol

At this time of year ponds can start to get over grown.

Marginal plants (those in shallow water around the $_\square$ edge) may start to take over, and those that flower early, $_\square$ like the yellow water iris will now be contributing only a

mass of leaves. Thin these drastically if necessary.

For the plants

Biennials such as wallflowers, forget-me-nots and winter \square flowering pansies sown in prepared beds during the last \square

month or so that have not yet germinated, probably have not been watered enough. If they have

germinated, thin to about 10-15 cm apart. Provided the ground is moist, thinnings can be transplanted to a

☐ spare piece of ground.

☐ If you or a neighbour has a pond, look out for dragonflies. These magnificent creatures are very

varied in size and colouring, but they can all hover and ☐ dart in a characteristic and fascinating way and are very ☐

colourful. Although some are large, they are perfectly ☐ harmless and most are beautiful if you study them

closely. Even at rest, their wings stretch out ready for sudden flight.

Rhubarb Cheesecake

4/5 Stalks of Rhubarb

4/5 pieces of crystalised Ginger finely chopped (if preferred a banana is just as nice) Lemon Jelly.

Ginger biscuits

300g Pack Light cream cheese 250 ml carton Soya Cream

Sprinkle sugar over rhubarb and ginger Dissolve Lemon Jelly in barely 1/2 pt of water Pour over rhubarb and ginger and cook until soft Strain, reserving juice & fruit separately Crush ginger biscuits & combine with melted butter to form crust in base of 8-9" dish. Whip together cream cheese with Soya cream until light and fluffy Gradually incorporate 1/2 to two thirds of reserved

juice

Pour over biscuit base and put in fridge to form a

Combine fruit with rest of juice and spread on top.

Elizabeth was born at Knowle Hill in Bengeworth and was brought up in the bungalow her parents had built in the orchard of the Knowle Hill Manor where her grandparents lived. She had to wait until after her 5th birthday before starting school. Her grandfather and his black Labrador used to meet her at the end of the day and they would walk home together except if it was raining and then her mother would meet her in the car but her grandfather still walked to the school and they all piled into the car, dog and all for a ride



home. In those days Mrs Churchill was the reception teacher. Elizabeth left Badsey School when she was 11 years old and went to Greenhill School where she became head girl. She then went to Worcester College for her 'A' levels and met her future husband, Peter, in the geography lectures which they both attended. Elizabeth then went to St Mary's Teacher Training College in Cheltenham and Peter joined the Fleet Air Arm as a helicopter pilot. They met up again when Elizabeth finished her time in Cheltenham and Peter was on leave. When they married in 1977 Peter left the Fleet Air Arm and went into the fire service and they lived at Bidford on Avon. Elizabeth began teaching at Pebworth First School in 1974 and in 1980 became Acting Head. This was the year they bought their cottage in Pebworth and in 1981 Elizabeth got a headship at Cleeve Prior CofE First School and was there for 20 years. During this time she was seconded to run other schools sometimes a term at a time. During this time Elizabeth brought up her two sons, Peter born in 1986 and Guy in 1991. Elizabeth came to Badsey as Head in April 2002. Since then there has been a lot of new buildings to the school and new classrooms. One improvement Elizabeth welcomes is that the toilets are now inside, when Elizabeth was a pupil at the school they were outside. The school now has computers and interactive white boards and there is trolley full of laptops to wheel round and palm held computers.

When Elizabeth began teaching there was no National Curriculum and there has been a big revolution in technology which has extended and enriched the curriculum offered to children today. Elizabeth said all the time she is looking for ways to enrich and broaden children's curriculum, e.g. Forest School Initiative, Modern Foreign Languages, Partnership School in Rheims.. Elizabeth says it is so magical to find the one thing that unlocks the imagination in any child and she never gets over the excitement. Her philosophy is to try to make the children self confident and give them lots of opportunity to be creative. She says it is that confidence that spills over into the academic subjects.
