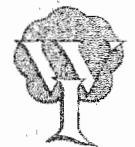

### BADSEY W.I.

Our September meeting started with a minute's silence in remembrance of two members who had sadly passed away, Louise Rastall who had been a member for many years and Grainne Windle. We also remembered Denny King of Wickhamford who had close associations with Badsey W.I. and had for many years been our Group Secretary.

Our speaker was Chris Tolkein from Station Road Nurseries, Blackminster who gave a very interesting and enlightening talk and demonstration on Winter Hanging Baskets. Chris showed us how to plant up baskets with foliage plants and herbs to last all winter and that could then either be kept in the basket or transferred to the garden. The trend at the moment is conical woven baskets which can be obtained in several different materials. Chris then surprised most of us by saying that the cheaper the wire hanging basket the better. This is because the wire used in the cheaper basket is so flexible you can push the wires apart or squeeze them together to enable you to make the right size hole for your plants and of course making planting them easier than trying to squeeze them through taut holes in the stronger wire baskets. The foliage baskets were lovely but Chris also showed us how to do winter pansies pointing out that yellow and blue were the strongest, longer lasting colours. The new apricot colour made a beautiful showing. Chris made it all look easy and said not to be too afraid of handling the plants as they were all a lot hardier than we expect them to be. He also put quite a few plants in each basket and you did wonder if they would all fit - they did.

Nomination slips for next year's committee were handed out and the President will be elected from the list at our AGM in October. Anna Tucker was in Evesham Hospital and making steady progress and Barbara Brotherton had broken her ankle but again was recovering nicely as is Hazel Stewart who has had a knee replacement operation. We are to cover and fill shoe boxes at our AGM for the shoe box appeal and Bob James is coming along to tell us a little about this project which brings so much happiness at Christmas to the orphanages and homes we hear so much about. We will also be donating goods to Helping Hands in January.

#### **Readers Weekend**

I do not know what a collection of Readers is called, but judging by the noise heard during mealtimes, seminars and in the bar area at a recent weekend at Holland House "a gaggle" might be appropriate. The theme of the weekend was "Fresh Expression of church." In 2006 a survey showed that only 15% of adults attended church regularly, more worrying was 60% do not know church except for occasional weddings, funerals and baptisms. Fresh Expressions are primarily for those who are not members of any church.

Fresh Expressions involve church members listening to and building relationships with members of the community, by loving and serving these members the church might build new communities. Last year on holiday in Cornwall I visited a coffee bar and drop in centre run by local churches for young people with nowhere else to meet. During the evening the gospel message was shown on a DVD to those who wished to watch. There were opportunities for the youngsters to share concerns in a safe environment. ## GARDENING TIPS

### For the plants:

Root cuttings are an interesting alternative to stem cuttings for some plants. If you have never tried this method of propagation you will find it rewarding. Most root cuttings are only successful during the plants' dormant season. Among the plants you can propagate now are anchusa, drumstick primula (*Primula Denticulata*), oriental poppies, phlox and verbascum.

### Good Housekeeping

Bamboo canes are less expensive than most other types of plant supports and they look more natural than the majority of the alternatives, but they will soon rot if you neglect them. It makes sense to preserve your investment, a quick and easy job. Rot thrives in the damp, so do not leave your canes in the garden for the winter. Clean them, dry them off and store in a dry shed.

### Visitors

The cheery and cheeky robin is a year round resident, but it visits gardens more frequently during the winter. Robins seem to appear from nowhere once you start digging, and will often keep you company, pecking up grubs exposed as you turn the soil. They prefer grubs and insects to fruit and berries so they should be encouraged. *John Cole*

## COOKERY

### Make a Pie this way

Line a suitable plate (size dependent upon requirement) with shortcrust pastry and bake blind for about 10 minutes.

Meanwhile prepare **squash** by peeling and slicing thinly. transfer to saucepan with a little **water, sugar and juice of a lemon.**

Vary amounts to quantity used, and cook until softened but still firm.

Drain, reserving juice.

Spread fruit over pastry base, and sprinkle with sugar.

Return juice to pan and thicken with arrowroot or cornflour and pour over fruit.

Cover with shortcrust pastry and bake until golden.

The taste of this resembles apricot.

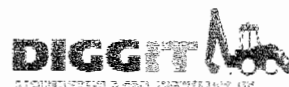

## October is the month to lift Beetroot for winter storage

Lift carefully with a fork trying not to damage the roots. Carefully remove soil and **twist** off the tops (do not cut as this will induce bleeding) about 2 inches from the bulb, reserving the very young red leaves for use in salads, and discard the rest to the compost heap. In a strong box layer sand or dry earth with the bulbs making sure they are covered from light etc. Finish off with a good layer of newspaper and store in shed or garage where it is nice and cool. Use as required. Have no advice for inquisitive mice other than to trap!

### The Oxford Worcester and Wolverhampton Railway

Our next meeting is a talk about local railway history. The speaker is John Boynton who has written several railway books. His talk is illustrated with his own comprehensive selection of slides. It is at 7.30pm on Friday 9 November in the Wheatsheaf Inn.

### Littleton and Badsey Station

In the 1960s, when Beeching was axing scores of small railway stations across the country, Michael Flanders and Donald Swann wrote

a song called *The Slow Train* including the lines –

“... On the slow train.  
I'll travel no more from  
Littleton Badsey to Openshaw ...”

The song is a requiem for all the small stations that were closed at this time. Littleton and Badsey station closed in 1966.

The story began when the station opened on 21 April 1884. It had a major impact on the market

gardening industry. Growers could rapidly send their crops to the wholesale markets in Manchester and Birmingham, as well as to Covent Garden in London. The Vale's prosperity over the following fifty years owed much to rail transport. The station and goods yard stood near the level crossing in Blackminster. It is hard to imagine what a busy place it once was. Queues of horse drawn carts waited to despatch their produce. A reconstruction drawn by local artist Ian Gibson gives an impression of how the station once looked.

The platform was very close to the level crossing. When a longer train stood in the station, the gates were often kept closed and the traffic made to wait. The gates were operated by turning a large wheel in the signal box next to the crossing.
